Astronomer Leaves Decision as to Possibility

of Life There to the Biologists

SAN JOSE, Cal., Sept. 15—People on the Planet Mars, if any live there, breathe an atmosphere which is almost destitute of moisture. This is the conclusion of Director W. W. Campbell of the Lick Observatory who returned recently from making observations from the summit of Mount Whitney, the highest point in the United States. "Water vapor on Mars does not exist in sufficient quantities to be detected by the spectroscopic method," says Professor Campbell. "This does not prove that life does not or cannot exist on Mars. The question of life under these conditions is a biologists' problem rather than an astronomer's."
