Ferguson of Yarmouth, N. S.; C. McQuin of Liverpool, N. S.; F. M. Simpson and E. Cosman of Yarmouth, N. S. They are quartered at the Dominion. Some of these men have had the doubtful pleasure of seeing their rams published as dead. All have the same stories of hardships and suffering to tell, of a vain quest for gold and a journey that lasted nearly two years over a trail that existed only in the imagination. Mr. Ferguson, one of the party, states that of the Hallfax party who went in over the Edmonton trail, only one man died. His name was Dimmock and he died of scurvy. A local paper recently published a sensational story about these Hallfax men, stating that the entire party had died by scurvy, starvation or drowning. Men arriving today say that with the exception of Dimmock, mentioned above, the party are all alive and well, making their way back to the coast.
