Here and There

CANADA IS PROVIDING FINEST GRASS SEED

So fine is the quality of the turf produced by Bent Grass seed, a comparatively new variety produced in Canada, that during the past five years between 1927 and 1931, 10,000 pounds of the seed have been exported to the United States each year. The crop produces from twenty to forty pounds of cleaned seed to the acre. It is used for lawns, golfing and bowling greens, and wherever the very best turf is required. The best quality is produced in Prince Edward Island. Purity of quality and clean seed are absolutely indispensable in the development of a first-class turf. This is assured in the Bent Grass seed when the body color is continued through the inspection service of the Canadian Government Seed Branch. Competent inspectors seal the sacks and only after very close inspection of the seed is the quantity and determining eligibility of the seed for certification. The seed is required to be ninety-five per cent pure, and the purity of the seed is guaranteed by Canadian and international requirements during the coming season.

OLD WAY TO COOK EGGS WAS ALL WRONG

It will come as a distinct shock to a lot of good cooks to learn that they don't even know how to boil an egg. Science, has, however, upset old practices and theories. New methods of slow cooking for eggs are being generally adopted as furnishing more palatable and more rapidly digested foods. Soft cooked and hard cooked eggs cooked slowly at a moderate, even heat, have taken the place of soft-boiled and hard-boiled.

MOCHA FUDGE RECIPE

3 cups granulated sugar 2 squares chocolate 1 tablespoonful butter (large) 1-3 cup milk Shelled hickory nuts or pecans 1 teaspoonful vanilla 1-2 cup strong coffee Cook the milk, chocolate and coffee together, add the butter and sugar and boil until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Stir in the nuts and flavor with vanilla. Beat until creamy and cool in buttered pans.

Await Decision Of Municipalities On Land Sett'l Scheme

Minister of Lands and Mines has advised Warden and Mayor of Edmundston of Plan to Promote "Back to the Land Movement" in New Brunswick. Fredericton, N. B. - Adoption of the Land Settlement Plan sponsored by the Federal Government and approved by the Province of New Brunswick now rests with the Municipalities throughout this province. Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines, who is the head of the Provincial Advisory Committee in charge of the "Back to the land" program in New Brunswick has now notified the 15 wardens and 22 mayors in the province of the details of the scheme and has urged upon them an early decision with regard to this matter.

RAILWAYS NEWS

Arrangements have been completed with the Canadian National Railway for the annual pilgrimage from the Maritimes to St-Anne-de-Beaupre. As in former years two trains will be operated, one carrying pilgrims from Nova Scotia and the other accommodating those from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. Rev. Father Cormier will be in charge of the Nova Scotia section and Rev. Father Cormier of Moncton will look after pilgrims from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The train with Nova Scotia pilgrims will leave Sydney on Monday, July 18th, picking up passengers enroute, and that with pilgrims from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island will leave Moncton on Tuesday, July 19th. It will be the first occasion upon which Rev. Father Cormier will have conducted a St. Anne de Beaupre pilgrimage. The train will pass through Edmundston by midnight, Tuesday, the 19th, and when returning, by 8 a. m. Tuesday, the 22nd. The return ticket sells \$10.00.

Interesting Links In Canada's History

During early pioneer times in Canada the wood-using industries were represented by the labor of individual wood-workers. It consisted chiefly of house and building construction and the manufacture by hand of furniture and vehicles, carried on in farm buildings or small workshops. Only in the case of shipbuilding was there anything approaching the modern factory system where workers at the same trade are contracted in large establishments. The first ship building in Canada was done by Pont-Grave who built two vessels at Port Royal in 1669 when he believed himself to have been deserted by de Monts. It was Talon, however, who gave shipbuilding in the colony the status of an industry and in 1665 before he left New France 350 men out of a total population of less than 7,000 were engaged in constructing wooden vessels.


NOISE SHOE WEARING DURING DEPRESSION

The photo shows workmen in the Holmes plant pouring molten iron from an overhead ladle into a casting box. The Holmes company is manufacturing cylinder blocks for the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, at East Windsor, Ontario, which is now engaged in volume production of the new Ford cars. The casting process is unusual inasmuch as the two cylinder blocks and the upper half of the crankcase are cast in one piece. This is the first time, so far as is known, that this has been accomplished in Canada. The production on account of the Ford company has resulted in increased activity at the Holmes plant and the re-employment of many workers.

AMOS AND ANDY FISHIN' IN N. B.


