Aug. 9.—Dalhousie 1881 scholars are establishing a good record. D. McIntosh of New Glasgow, who won the scholarship four years ago, has his tenure of it extended to a third year. And now it is learned that E. H. Archibald of Harmony, Colchester County, who won it two years ago, has had a similar success. The scholarship is usually held for two years only. But in exceptional cases in which it appears to the commissioners, who grant the scholarship, to be likely that extended to a third year, would result in works of scientific importance such extension is granted. The work which Mr. Archibald has done in the Harvard Laboratory was submitted some months ago to the commissioners' scientific advisers with the above gratifying result, which gives Mr. Archibald the privilege of studying for an additional year at any university he may select and £150 sterling to pay his expenses.
