Ottawa, June 2.—With a procession in which marched 5,000, an open air mass meeting with some 15,000 persons present and a great banquet the United St. Joseph of Canada, one of the two strongest French-Canadian fraternal societies in existence today, celebrated the 50th anniversary of its foundation. NO CAR LINE
TO ROCKWOOD

Company Informs Commissioners Extension to Park is Out of the Question at Present.

It is planned on having a band stand in the Fairville school grounds where weekly concerts probably will be given. It is expected to be ready for use in about a fortnight. One of the city bands has offered its services, and others are expected to assist.

The question of extending the street railway line to Rockwood Park was discussed by the commissioners yesterday morning. They have taken up the matter with the St. John Railway Company. In reply to the inquiries of the commissioners the management of the company informed them that it would be impossible for them to undertake the work until after the new highway bridge had been completed across the reversing falls and they had completed the extension to their lines which are now under way and others which they contemplate.

Home from Europe. Mrs. J. M. Robinson and her daughter, Miss Nora Lee Robinson, have returned to the city after spending about seven months on the continent of Europe and in England. They left here on November 7th and spent Christmas in Florence, after which they went to Rome. From Rome they went to Switzerland, in which country they stayed for some months, afterwards crossing to London. They had a delightful trip.

At the annual meeting of the Ludlow street Baptist church Sunday afternoon reports were submitted showing that 287 members are enrolled and that a total of \$688.54 had been raised for all purposes last year. Colwell; cradle roll and primary department superintendent, Miss Ermie Cochran.

On 1,500 Mile Tramp. New York, June 3.—Edward Payson Weston, famous long distance pedestrian, who has twice crossed the continent afoot, started today on a 1,500 mile tramp to Minneapolis. The seventy-five-year-old walker expects to complete the journey in sixty days, excluding Sundays. In Minneapolis he is to visit the corner of the Inner Temple, a profession he had taken up purely to please his parents. After the death of his father in 1881 he devoted himself to travel and literature, and in 1896 was appointed poet laureate in succession to Tennyson. Austin's poetical writings include The Seasons, a satire, The Golden Age, Interludes, Madonna's Child, The Tower of Babel, The Human Tragedy, Alfred the Great, Flooded Field, The Door of Humility, Sacred and Profane Love, and many others. He was also the author of a number of prose volumes.

St. Petersburg, June 2.—The ministry of justice has ordered the trial of Mendel Belliss, accused of the murder of a Christian, to be held in a public building, on March 25, 1911, near Kiev. It will be in June or July. It is announced that the prosecutor will uphold the theory of the murder and that probably the trial will be held with closed doors. The mutilated body of Yushchinsky, a thirteen year old boy, was discovered in a small cave on a suburban holding just outside of Kiev. The hands were tied behind the back. A post mortem examination revealed forty-seven wounds.

Improvements at Rotheysay College. Arrangements for erecting an extension to the main building of the Rotheysay Collegiate school have been completed and the work will start before long. At present the school can accommodate fifty-five boys, but this accommodation has been found insufficient and the addition will provide for about thirty more.

Street Car Men Want Raise. A petition has been presented to the management by the conductors and motormen in the employ of the St. John Street Railway Co., asking for an increase in pay to the amount received by the Halifax street railway carmen. The petition was signed by every conductor and motorman, and if the request contained in it is granted, it will mean an increase of about a cent and a half an hour in general, with twenty-nine cents pay an hour on Sundays.
