Acted as Paymaster for German Out Labor Leaders—Arrested—All Charged with American Ammunition Factories

New York, Dec. 23.—Congressman Frank Buchanan, of Illinois; H. Robert Fowler, former congressman from Illinois; Frank S. Monett, former labor lawyer-general of Ohio; David Laman, Jacob G. Taylor, president of Labor's National Peace Council; Frank Von Hiltelen, a German agent; H. B. Martin and Herman Schultze, were indicted by a federal grand jury today for conspiring to foment strikes in American munitions factories.

All indictments except Laman's and Von Hiltelen's are officers or former officers of the peace council, an organization which the government and charges, was formed and financed by the Russian spy-master, it is charged with all strikes in munitions plants in furtherance of German propaganda in this country.

Laman, who has been called "The Wolf of Wall Street," is charged with being Hiltelen's paymaster. It is charged that he has received thousands of dollars.
