SEVERAL MEETINGS OF IMPORTANCE Will Be Held in New York this Week - Are Bearing on Baseball and Tennis During Coming Season.

New York, Feb. 10.—Several meetings which will have an important bearing on baseball and tennis during the coming season, will be held in this city next week—the International League Club owners meeting on Monday; the National League Managers' Tuesday and Wednesday; those of the American League on Thursday, while on Friday occurs the annual meeting of the National Lawn Tennis Association.

Of the four conferences, the gathering of the International League holds the greatest uncertainty. Questions to be decided involve the continuation of the league for the period of the war; the selection of a successor to President E. G. Barrow. In case it is resolved to operate the league this year; and the curtailing or readjustment of the circuit under the conditions.

President Barrow's resignation to take effect tomorrow has been in the hands of the International League Club owners since December when the league voted to reduce his salary from \$7,500 to \$2,500. If it is decided to continue with a six club organization and a shorter schedule, and to elect a successor to Barrow, the names of James Price and Arthur Irwin have been prominently mentioned for the place.

The adoption of the 1918 schedule and other routine business compose the programs of both the National League and American League. It is probable there will be an attempt by the National League to pass a rule curtailing the big cash deals in players which have grown to such proportions this winter as to create dissatisfaction among both players and managers of both leagues who hold either formal or informal conferences relative to the settlement of obligations incurred with federal league backers at the time of the peace agreement some two years ago.

Delegates to the Tennis Association will vote upon the executive committee's recommendation to national and to sectional championship play during 1918, and the awarding the same should the recommendation be adopted as appears likely.

Montreal, Feb. 10.—Toronto gained an easy victory over the Canadiens at the Jubilee rink here Saturday night in the scheduled National Hockey League game. The score was 7 to 3. The Canadiens showed a reversal of form in this game, as on the previous visit to the Toronto here the Canadiens had a similar easy win. The visitors played in better form than when here before and outclassed the Frenchmen at almost every stage of the last two periods. They checked so close and hard that Malone, the Canadian, chief scorer, had little opportunity to shoot and was not effective. Lalonde was again absent from the local rink as he had been from the Canadiens and Malone took centre. After the Toronto had gone into the second period a few minutes it was apparent that they had the game well in hand. The Canadiens managed to secure one goal in each period and this kept up the interest in a contest that was too one-sided to be exciting. There was only one unpleasant incident. Couture, one of the reserve men of the Canadiens, deliberately slashed Skinner of the Toronto wings across the ribs with his stick and was given a major penalty for the offence.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 19 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Dues—Six months residence upon cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an additional quarter-section as pre-emption price \$100 per acre. Dues—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homesteaded patent and subdivide 50 acres extra. Pre-emption patent as soon as homesteaded patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase price \$100 per acre. Dues—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homesteaded patent and subdivide 50 acres extra. Pre-emption patent as soon as homesteaded patent on certain conditions.

Holder of entries may count time of employment as farm laborer in Canada during 1917, as residence under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry, at least one day after (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.
