Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the following Petitions were severally read:-

Bennett and others, of the Township of Alyoma; of William Brown and others, of the Township of Stafford; of Michael Mulligan and others, of the Township of Browly; of John Howie and others, of the Township of Ross; of John Rankin and others, of the said Township of Ross, in the County of Renfrew, severally praying the House to take such measures as to cause the obstructions of the navigation of the Ottawa River to be removed, and an uninterrupted line to the full capacity of the leading channel, and the supply of water from the summittevel to be opened throughout.

Of F. Hudon, and others, merchants and traders, of the City of Montreal, praying for the repeal of the "Insolvent Act, 1864," and the amendments thereto.

A Message was brought from the House of Commons, by Mr. MacKenzie and others, in the following words:—

House of Commons, Wednesday, 21st April, 1869.

Ordered, That Mr. Mackenzie do carry the said Mossage to the Senate.

Resolved, That the Standing Committee appointed for the present Session on the subject of Printing, (viz): the Honorable Messieurs Simpson, Burnham, Reesor, Olivier, Sanborn, Dumouchel, Skead, Anderson, Locke, Steeves, Odell and Bureau, be instructed to act on behalf of this House with the Committee of the House of Commons as a Joint Committee of both Houses on the subject of Printing, as desired in their Message of this day.

Ordered, That the foregoing Resolution be communicated to the House of Commons by one of the Masters in Chancery.

The Honorable Mr. Bureau moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Ryan,

That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause to be laid before this House copies of—

1st. All papers and documents relating to the accusation, trial and condemnation of the Revd. John McMathon, a Roman Catholic Priest, after the invasion of Fenians in the County of Welland, in the Province of Ontario, on the second day of June, 1866.

2nd. All Petitions and memorials praying for the pardon of the said Revd. John McMahon

or the commutation of his sentence.

3rd. Any notes or reports of the Judge who presided at the trial of the said Royd. John McMahon, addressed to the Governor in Council, and all Reports of Council or Orders in Council on the above subject.
