In the case of the Glebe Trustees vs. Harvey, an action under the over-holding tenants act, tried yesterday, Judge Bell decided for the Trustees, each party to pay their own costs. The defendant has a week to vacate the premises.

Chief of Police John Holmes has returned from a trip to Kingston. He visited Port Hope while away. It is 32 years since Mr. Holmes was in Port Hope. Then he worked in the flour mill there. Harold Barrett, a son of his old boss, still has a flour mill in Port Hope, but the stone process has been replaced by a huge roller mill. In Kingston the Chief visited the Penitentiary and saw the convicts making clothes for the Northwest Indians. There are at present 457 prisoners in the Kingston Penitentiary. This is a lower number of boarders than they usually have and speaks well for Ontario.

The National Prison Association of the United States held the annual congress in Louisville, Ky., on Oct. 3rd to 8th, 1908. The report of the meeting is just to hand and contains the following reference to Chatham:—"From Chatham, Canada, comes the opinion that stealing a ride on a railway should be prima facie evidence of vagrancy, and that the return of criminals to either Canada or the United States should be facilitated to the fullest practicable extent, political offenders only excepted." The officials of the congress communicated with Judge Houston and he furnished the information embodied in the report.

John Piggott & Sons, lumbermen, of this city, received word yesterday morning that their schooner, the Erie Stuart, was on the rocks at Thessalon, lumber port, on Georgian Bay, as a result of a gale last night.

As in all cases when a southeast wind springs up all ships anchor out. The Stuart was among them. The gale was so strong, however, that the schooner dragged anchor and was blown on the rocks. The schooner was loaded with a cargo of lumber and filled with water.

Joseph King, of Dover, one of the oldest residents in the township, passed away Wednesday, aged 88 years. Deceased has been ill for the last three weeks with heart trouble, and the immediate cause of death was heart failure.

Mr. King was born in Quebec and came here about thirty years ago, and has since resided in Dover.

He leaves a family of four sons and three daughters. They are Thomas, of Detroit, Joseph, Charles, and Dover, Mrs. Dulcet, of Tilbury, and a married daughter in Detroit.

The funeral took place this Friday morning at 9 o'clock to the Pain Court cemetery.

It would not be out of place either to state that some of the streets were not driven over very fast for reasons the same as anyone else would have driving over the same roads.

The Engineer got his orders to fill up the holes and put the roads generally into good shape. As a result the scrapers are out and the work is being pushed ahead.
