ENGLISH SHEPHERDS FIND SHEEP PROFITABLE EVEN ON THEIR HIGH PRICED LAND

Well bred flocks of sheep are becoming all too rare in Canada. Our farmers have given sheep husbandry so little attention that the value of these "golden hoofed" animals is not realized. In England, however, with higher land values and more expensive feed the sheep is still regarded as one of the most profitable of domestic animals. More well bred flocks of sheep are found in England than in the same area anywhere else in the world. Intelligent breeding and careful management explain the success of the English sheeherds. The English bred sheep here illustrated are of a breed little known in this country, the Ryeland.

The breed is found in Herefordshire, England, and is characterized by the fineness

of its fleece.
