### THE MINING REVIEW

#### Several Strikes of Minor Importance During the Week.

#### WEEKLY OUTPUT INCREASING

The Last Six Months of the Year will Witness a Still Further Increased Output—The Lily May, Leiter, and Green Mountain all Showing up well.

The British America corporation has purchased the Caledonia group of 11 claims over on the west branch of Big Sheep creek in the neighborhood of Sophie mountain. The vendor was Sir Sanford Fleming. The amount of the purchase money has not been made public. Only assessment work will be undertaken on the group this season by the new owners.

A considerable body of ore has been found on the Lily May, in the south belt. The ore will average about \$7 a ton. The I. X. L. Mining company has resumed work vigorously on its property on O. K. mountain with very good success. The ore vein when first encountered on the resumption of work, was about a foot in width, but as the work proceeded, it has widened out to nearly three feet. The Evening Star, the Green Mountain, the Homestake and the Leiter are credited with finds of more or less importance during the week.

The ore shipments during the past week show a decided gain over the previous week, but they are still below the estimate looked for. The Le Roi heads the list with 54 carloads, or 1,728 tons. The War Eagle and Centre Star combined sent down 65 carloads, or 1,950 tons. The Evening Star is credited with a carload, but the Iron Mask is not back on the shipping list yet. The total output for the week just closed was 3,708 tons. As stated early in the week, the rotation of cars in the Columbia & Western were at first given loads of 35 and 40 tons per car, but so much trouble arose in getting the ore trains down to Trail over the new roadbed, the cars getting off the track frequently and blocking the traffic, that orders were given not to exceed 30 tons to the car until the roadbed was put into better condition. In consequence, the estimate for the 66 carloads sent down to Trail has been put at 30 tons per car, or 1,980 tons.

The repairs to the compressor in the Le Roi were completed this day last week, and Rossland's premier mine has been in full running order all week. One thousand seven hundred and twenty-eight tons, about the average weekly output of ore, was sent down to the Northport smelter. In addition to work on the several levels and on the present main shaft, where a sink' below 85 feet is maintained, the extension of the new tunnel on the Black Bear ground is being pushed along as usual.

The compressor was shut down in the early part of the week for the purpose of making repairs and to clean the boiler. The piston of the compressor is broken and a new one is being made at the shops of the British America corporation. It is thought the new piston will be finished on Monday and then operations on the Iron Horse will be resumed.

The contract work on the long tunnel in the Jumbo is being steadily carried on. There is nothing special to report during the past week. On the 250-foot level the ore body has been crosscut and is found to be eight feet in width. The main tunnel has been driven for a distance of over 300 feet. A contract for furnishing 1,000 cords of wood for winter consumption has been let. Captain James Morrish, the consulting engineer for the New Canadian Gold Fields of British Columbia, which owns and operates the Veldre, is here from London, and visited the property during the week.

There were no shipments of ore from the Iron Mask during the past week. Mr. James F. Herrick, the managing director of the company, was in town on Thursday last to inspect the improvements about completed. Sixty men are now employed in the mine, ore sorting has started once more, and the loss of the present week will see the Iron Mask back on the shipping list, with an increased output.

Sinking on the inclined shaft from the lower tunnel is in progress, and it is now down a distance of eight feet. The ore chute is now known to be wider than was at first supposed. Handling ore from the mine to the upper station on the Columbia & Western continues. The mine is credited with a shipment of one car of ore of 30 tons during the week. Shipments, the management says, will be kept up.

Mr. Hastings, the superintendent of the War Eagle, has been out of town all week, and there is no special news about the War Eagle as the week closes. The electrical compressor has had several runs during the week, but is not yet working continuously. The output for the week was 1,440 tons.

The foundations for the new compressor plant for the Centre Star, adjoining the present hoist, are being pushed along, and a good force of men are employed in construction work. Five hundred and ten tons were shipped to the Trail smelter during the week.

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### THE STOCK MARKET

#### There was Considerable Moving Among the Standards.

#### OKANOGANS ARE LIVELY

Gopher Has Advanced a Few Points—Operations on the Lardeau-Goldsmith are to be Resumed—Another Stock Exchange is Being Organized.

The market has not been very lively during the week which ended last evening, but a good many played the old favorites, such as Winnipeg, Homestake, Okanogan, Iron Mask, Canadian Gold Fields and Van Ande.

The Rossland Mining and Stock Board is in process of organization. It will start off as soon as it is ready for business with a membership of 15. It is made up of some enterprising brokers and should increase the stock business of this city.
