MOST ENJOYABLE

Was the Concert on Behalf of the Chaplain's Fund of the 125th Battalion.

A very charming concert was given in the Brant Avenue Methodist church last night. It was arranged by the choir on behalf of the Chaplain's Fund of the 125th Brant Battalion, and this was a good attendance. Miss Irene Symons, of the Trinity Methodist church quartette, Toronto, was the vocal soloist, and her singing was a delight. Miss Symons is a soprano and a sweet yet powerful voice of very even register, and she gets even her long-sustained fortissimo effects without apparently the slightest effort. There is none of the reaching after notes so painful with some performers. The Aria from Madame Butterfly (Puccini) was a notable piece of phrasing, and the Ave Maria, (Bach-Gounod) with violin obligato by Miss Jotex, was a delight. In her lighter numbers, if indeed such a song can be so classed, Tosti's Good-Bye was given a memorable interpretation. Miss Symons is a little artist—every inch of her. Miss Marjorie Jones was, as usual, heard to very great advantage in violin solos. The sonorous breadth of her bowing was in particular beautifully emphasized in the opening portions of the "Adagio and Moto Perpetuo" by Ries. In all of her numbers she demonstrated exceptional facility in the matter of interpretation and execution.
