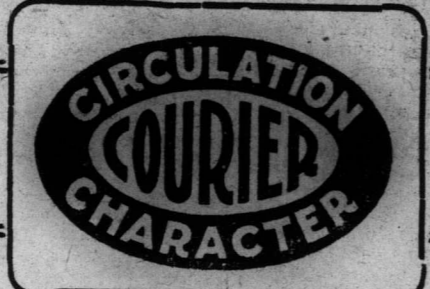

NOTICE OF CANADIAN HOMESTEAD LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of arable Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Details relative to residence, open and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption, before homesteading a quarter-section. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homesteaded patent on certain conditions. Settler after obtaining homesteaded patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase homesteaded to certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Must reside six months of every three years. Cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.00. Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917 as residence duties under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged receive one day priority in applying for entry per acre.
