SHE THREW AN AXE

Attempt on the Life of Emperor
William Which Failed.

Breslau, Nov. 16.—Emperor William
was the object of an attempted out-
rage to-day, which, however, failed.
As he was driving in an open carriage
to the Cuirassier barracks, accompa-
nied by the hereditary prince of Sax-
Meiningen, a woman in the crowd
hurled an axe at the carriage. The
rapidity with which the vehicle was
passing saved its occupants. The axe,
or hatchet, fell just behind the car-
riage. The woman was immediately
arrested.

LANDLORD AND TENANT

Fall out and Litigation Results—A
Harwich Law Suit.

Barrister W. F. Smith, acting for
Samuel French, Harwich, has issued a
writ against David Wilson, of Harwich.
The defendant owns a farm near Har-
wich, and last October leased it to the
plaintiff, French, for three years.
It is an unenclosed farm and the plain-
tiff was to clear it off and reduce it to
a state of cultivation for the use of
the defendant and further more that
the defendant agreed to furnish a
team of horses, the necessary imple-
ments, seed grain and other articles,
and did so. The plaintiff was to give
the defendant, two-thirds of produce and
keep a third. The plaintiff cleared 40
acres and raised corn and beans. The
defendant in September notified the
plaintiff that he was going to termi-
nate the lease and forbid him doing
any more work. On the 27th of Oc-
tober, the defendant is alleged to have
come to the place and taken away the
team and a plough. This is what the
plaintiff says, and he states that this
stopped him doing any more work, as
he could do nothing without horses.
The defendant denies this and says
that he desired to terminate the lease.
The plaintiff sues for damages for
breach of contract, an injunction re-
straining defendant from interfering with
plaintiff and asks for an order for the
return of the horses and the plough.

LOSE POSSESSION

The Corporation Must Relinquish
Tecumseh Park

To the Dominion Government - Who Will
Use it for Military Purposes.

This morning City Clerk Merritt re-
ceived the following government com-
munication:

Office of Chief Superintendent,
Ottawa, Nov. 11, 1900.

City Clerk,
Chatham:

Sir,—I have the honor to inform you
that the department has cancelled the
lease held by you from it for property
in Chatham, and that possession will
be resumed by the department on the
first of December instant, as it is
required for immediate use for
military purposes. I have the honor
to be, sir, your obedient servant,
D. A. MACDONALD,
Lt. Colonel.

The lease alluded to was made be-
tween the government and the city
on May 1st, 1879 for 21 years and con-
sequently expired in May last. It
provided that Tecumseh park should
be let to the city for the nominal ren-
tal of one dollar. The lease was
signed by Wm. Northwood, mayor,
and T. H. Masson, minister of militia
and defence. It was witnessed by
Rufus Stephenson, then M. P. for
Kent.

It is now understood that in connec-
tion with the reorganization of the
Kent Battalion a fully equipped arm-
ory will be erected on the Park, and
that it will be devoted to military use.

MORAL DEGENERATION.

Rev. Talbot Smith, a magazine
writer of New York city, lectured last
evening in St. Joseph's Church on the
subject of "Moral Disease." Mr.
Smith referred especially to the lack
of religion in the school, public in-
stitutions and home life generally. He
said that in the present day in Eng-
lish speaking countries the only place
that religion is found is in the church.
Mr. Smith deplored this lack of
Christianity in the state and char-
acterized the English speaking world
as a compact of infidels. A splen-

WANT TO CLOSE THEM UP.

Detroit Free Press.—Representatives of
six different wagon manufacturing concerns,
called the Ontario Wagon Makers' Associa-
tion, held a conference with Curry & McGre-
gor, of Windsor, yesterday, with a view to
purchasing the stock in the Miller-Walker
Wagon Co., of Walkerville, now held by
Harper's Hospital and the Children's Free
Hospital, of Detroit. Of the stock in the
company, \$25,000 was left to the two
hospitals by the late Hiram Walker, and
some weeks ago the factory was closed
down, as the directors of the hospitals
wished to realize on the stock. The as-
sociation proposes to buy part of the plant
and remove it. The proposition, however,
is considered unadvisable, and the money
consideration offered is believed to be too
low. The hospitals' trustees will discuss
the question today.
