Fall out and Litigation Fesuts -A Harwich Law Suit.

Barrister W. F. Smith, acting for Samuel French, Harwich, has issued a writ against David Wilson, of Howard. The defendant owns a farm near Fargo, and last October leased it to the plaintiff, French, for three years. It is an uncleared farm and the plaintiff was to clear it off and reduce it to a state of cultivation. This much the plaintiff alleges and further more that the defendant agreed to furnish a team of horses, the necessary implements, seed grain and other articles. team of horses, the necessary implements, seed grain and other articles, and did so. The plaintiff was to give defendant, two-thirds of produce and keep a third. The plaintiff cleared 40 acres and raised corn and beans. The defendant in September notified the plaintiff that he was going to terminate the lease and forbid him, doing any more work. One the 27th of Oct. ate the lease and forbid him doing any more work. Onn the 27th of October, the defendant is alleged to have come to the place and taken away the team and a plough. This is what the plaintiff says, and he states that this stopped him doing any more work, as, he could do nothing without horses. Defendant also served a written notice, that he desired to terminate the lease. The plaintiff sues for damages for breach of contract, an injunction re-straining defendant interfering with plaintiff and asks for an order for the return of the horses and the plough.
