WITH OUR LITTLE ONES

Many Parents and Friends Paid a Visit to McKeough School Kindergarten Yesterday.

The Class Presented a Charming Picture in Their Pretty Drill and Exercises—Tribute to the Ladies in Charge.

The closing exercises at the McKeough school kindergarten—an event which is looked forward to with delight by many of the mothers in North Chatham—were held yesterday afternoon in the McKeough school.

The large Assembly Hall, which was very tastefully decorated for the occasion with flowers, flags and bunting, presented a very attractive appearance, the credit of which is due to the splendid directress, Miss V. Aylesworth, and her able assistants, Misses Helen McTaggart and Vida Farquharson.

Every available space in the hall was occupied by the fond parents who had come, anticipating a rare treat from their little tots and in this respect they were not in the least disappointed. The little ones went through their exercises and drills with a wonderful degree of spirit and interest, which is seldom found in children of their age. Too much cannot be said of Miss Aylesworth, the accomplished lady director. This is her second year as teacher of the McKeough school kindergarten and she has every reason to be proud of the flattering results which have accompanied her work. Her success is undoubtedly due to her own happy disposition and winning ways, which have endeared her in the hearts of her pupils. She understands thoroughly the nature of the children over which she has charge and this, accompanied by her quick wit and resourceful mind, makes her very efficient, in keeping the children employed and interested.

At the opening of the concert yesterday, the children, about 50 in number, were arranged around three sets of tables. In front of each was a fancy paper box, filled with flowers. These boxes, which were very nicely gotten up, were the creations of the children themselves. After singing the following songs:—Baster Hymn, Sun, Light, Song, Rain, Sun, Bird Song, Spring Song, Garden Bed, Woods, Family and Basket, the children presented their parents with the flower baskets. The songs which were led by Miss Aylesworth, were accompanied with gestures by the children, which added much to the enjoyment of their singing. Miss McTaggart proved an ideal accompanist.

The feature of the entertainment, however, was the marching which introduced the second part of the concert. Each child was provided with a flag and went through the drills in a manner which would have done credit to the 24th Regiment. During the marching, they sang: The Land of the Maple, Now the time for play has come, Skipping Song, See Saw, tripping game, Blacksmith and others. After the concert, the children were treated to ice cream, as a fitting reward for their splendid little achievements.

A MUSICAL INNOVATION

Very Delightful Complimentary Graduating Piano Recital by Miss Maud Wees.

Admirable Program of Varied Classical Contributions—Other Artists Assisted.

An innovation of a metropolitan character was introduced into this city last evening by Miss Maud Wees in the piano recital which that talented young lady gave in the lecture hall of the Park St. Methodist church. Miss Wees is a young lady of more than ordinary musical ability, combined with application in study. Her home is in Warren, Minn., and for the past two years she has been studying music in this city at the Krause Conservatory of Music. Prior to her return west, Miss Wees gave this complimentary graduating recital, which was largely attended by a very cultured audience.

Although not a resident of this city, Miss Wees claims Chatham township as her birthplace, and Maple Cityites were proud to claim Miss Wees as a native of this county after hearing her at the recital. The musical program was one of the finest and most classical ever presented in the city, and R. Victor Carter was proud as he well might be to see his pupil give such an exhibition of her ability in regard to piano playing.

Miss Wees has a number of noticeably fine points in her playing, among which were quite pronounced, her magnificent touch, her realistic expression, her ease of technique, her artistic finish and ability to interpret the compositions correctly. She has great breadth of style, and evidenced fine conception of phrasing and clearness and firmness of tone. In the fourth number of the second part, "Impromptu," by Schubert, the young lady pianist displayed excel-

lent scale work, and the second number, "In the Forest," was exquisite in rendition and full of grandeur of style. "Suite," by Arensky, for two pianos, by Miss Wees and Mrs. R. Victor Carter, was a feature of the many delightful musical renditions. A striking characteristic of this number was the excellent and simultaneous attack on the part of both artists. Mrs. Carter ably sustained the second piano part, showing to exquisite advantage her marvellous touch and technique. Mrs. Milton Bogart, Miss Allie Humphrey, and Robert Knight, pupils of Miss Idle, and Henry McCaw, violin virtuoso, assisted in the program.

Mr. White took Miss White's place and sang Beethoven's "Flight of the Dove," and sang it splendidly. Mrs. Milton Bogart gave the ballad "When to thy vision," from Faust. The solo exhibited to good purpose the fine, sympathetic quality of her voice. The violin solo given by Mr. McCaw was excellently executed. The piece was one that displayed prominently the fine points of Mr. McCaw's musical talent, and his rendition was much admired.

Miss Allie Humphrey rather excelled herself in the solo, "Still as Night," and she has seldom been heard to better advantage. The accompaniments were all played by Miss Lilian Pratt. Miss Pratt has a special talent for this work, and her playing was a feature of the program.

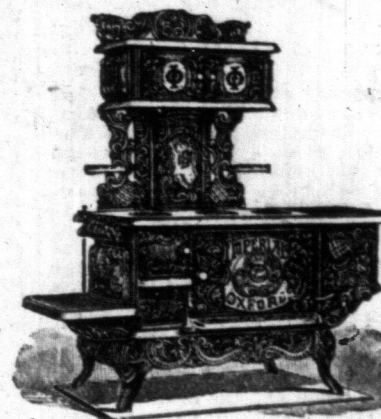

CITY'S CHANCE

What the Mineral Baths Will Undoubtedly Do for the Maple City.

J. M. Pike, of the firm of Wilson, Kerr & Pike, was in Mount Clemens over Sunday the guest of Dr. R. H. Martin, son of ex-Mayor S. T. Martin in Cleveland, but is now in Mount Clemens.

"Business seems to be good in Mount Clemens," said Mr. Pike to The Planet this morning. "All of the bath houses are filled, and the town is thriving. The property in the business part of the city is very valuable and it appears very hard work to secure any property in the main part of the town an large cash offers of over \$100 per foot are daily being refused. People there have fixed the price of their property and will not take anything less. I don't see any reason why Chatham should not be a more favorable place than Mount Clemens for mineral baths. For one thing, we have better water facilities. Mount Clemens is situated inland and the people have to travel there in electric cars which are generally crowded and very uncomfortable, while Chatham has excellent boat and railway service. When I was coming home on 'The City of Chatham,' I heard a number of Detroit people talking in very complimentary terms of the excellent scenery on the river between Chatham and the light house. I think that when the bath houses are finally established, they will boom our city."

"There is no doubt that the mineral baths are paying in Mount Clemens. A number of the bath houses are being remodelled and porcelain tubs are replacing the former wooden ones. Dr. Martin has been in Mount Clemens for several weeks and he has not yet been able to secure an office up town. He speaks in glowing terms of the opportunities of a young man in Mount Clemens and of the prospects for professional business."
