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THE WATER QUESTION.

In view of the wide discussion on the water question, the following from the London Free Press will be of interest. The opinions expressed below go to show that experience has proven that meters are not always considered the best means for preventing waste of water. The article is worthy of the consideration of the Water Commissioners and the water-users:

"Chairman Fred Darch, of the Water Commission, returned Friday night from Toronto from the convention of the international water-works association, at which experts were present from all parts of the country.

"Saturday Mr. Darch stated that as a result of the papers he heard, and the consensus of opinion in the subsequent discussion that it would be much more economical for the city of London to look for more water than to attempt to effect a saving by the installation of meters, the latter cost being the greater.

"In a paper read by Consulting Engineer Raster, of Rochester, that gentleman stated that Rochester was a metered city, but that it did not follow that the expenditure of the sum required was always justified by the results secured. After fifty per cent. of the city had been metered it was found that the metering of the other portion was not justified by the amount of elimination of waste.

"Asked the question as to whether there would be a saving over the expenditure for meters if a search was made for other water, Mr. Raster said that this would depend on local conditions."

SHORT CROP OF JUNE BRIDES.
