Colonial Secretary Says British Government Will Take No Action.

London, May 29.—(C. A. P.)—In the House of Commons yesterday Walter Runciman, Parliamentary secretary of the local Government Board, replying to J. J. Mooney, said Lord Strathcona had informed Lord Elgin that he was not implicated either personally or as High Commissioner in the emigration charges, and Lord Elgin did not propose to interfere, or make any representation to Canada on the subject.

Swift MacNeil asked if it was not the case, whether the High Commissioner had a strictly non-political office, and whether Strathcona was one of the principal tariff reformers.

The Speaker said that the question did not arise out of the one on the paper.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Ottawa, May 29.—At the evening session of the House, Mr. Beauparlant (St. Hyacinthe) introduced a resolution providing that every person who presses hay for trade shall attach to each bale or bundle, a label marked as set forth in the resolution. After discussion, the resolution was simplified by an amendment presented by Mr. Borden and deferred with the bill to the committee on agriculture.

In reply to W. F. Maclean, Mr. Emmerson said the matter of companies' regulation, re. express and others, was under consideration.

Before adjournment, Mr. R. L. Borden gave notice that he would move for a select committee of nine to be appointed for the purpose of inquiring into the management, alienation and disposal of the Crown lands of Canada, etc.

Sir Frederick Borden will propose to the House a resolution declaring it expedient to amend the Militia Act in certain respects.
