POLITICAL INDEPENDENCE.

In the course of an important speech recently delivered by John A. Cooper, editor of the Canadian Magazine, he said the future welfare of Canada was constantly in his thoughts, and his remarks have been very favorably commented upon by many of the leading journals in the country. He made a strong plea for civil service reform, and instanced department at Ottawa where the head had declared that it was impossible to institute certain reforms or to carry on its work satisfactorily because he was given a large number of inefficient men to do the work that one-quarter the number of efficient employes could accomplish more satisfactorily and in a very much less space of time. **** He contended for the adoption of the British system, which removes the civil service from the field of petty politics, and suggested that the principle of government should re ceive more attention in the schools and colleges of the country. He deplored the fact that until recently there had been no course in Canadian history in the University of Toronto, and suggested a course in civico comprising lessons in municipal, provincial and national affairs. He pleaded also for greater independence in politics, and declared that it was a disgrace that any man have it said of him, after he had closed a long life, that he was a life-long Conservative or Liberal and had never voted except for one party. Neither party, he said, should remain in power too long, and every true citizen who realizes the sacred nature of his franchise should vote against his party when it is in the public interest that the party should cease to hold power. As years roll along the independence of all true Canadians is becoming more and more liberal, and, as in the recent general election in Ontario, we saw Reformers by the hundreds joining with Conservatives to overthrow the Ross Administration.
