Hockey.

The second game of the Nova Scotia Amateur Hockey League was played at Evangeline rink last Friday evening, in the presence of about 600 spectators. The fact that Wolfville won the first game by such a narrow margin, increased the interest in the game and brought about 150 fans on the special train from Windsor. The game was the fastest and most exciting seen here in many years, and only by playing overtime did Windsor succeed in winning, the score being 5-4. The game was not a good exhibition of team work, but every player on each team played as if his life depended upon it, and at times the excitement was intense. At no time during the game could the outcome be foreseen. As B. Shaw was unable to play for Wolfville his place was taken by L. Eaton, whose appearance on the ice was greeted with loud applause. Len played a good game and it is too bad he cannot be prevailed upon to play in the remaining games. Eagles and Baird showed their accustomed speed and Christie played his usual steady game. Fraser, Webster and Sleep played a good defence game and saved the day on many an occasion. The Windsor boys played a hard game and all showed up well. Their defence was especially strong. Sexton and J. Smith played a hard fast game and frequently drew cheers from the boards.

At 3 o'clock Referee Young started the game and for the first half of the period Wolfville made repeated attempts to score, but could not get past Windsor's defence. Finally after ten minutes play Eagles scored the first goal for Wolfville. Soon after this the visitors scored twice in quick succession, and the period ended with the score 1-3 in Windsor's favor. In the second period Sexton scored for Windsor and Baird for Wolfville. After six minutes play in the third period Eaton tied the score, and soon after Eagles put Wolfville in the lead. Near the end of the period L. Shaw scored for Windsor, thus tying the score. In the play-off the visitors shot the winning goal after three minutes of play.

Death of James L. Simson.

Dr. Borden, of Grand Pre, at which the interment was made. Mr. Simson was a good citizen, who will be much missed.
