

### Wm. J. Bryan Nominated

Denver, Colo. July 10.—William Jennings Bryan, of Nebraska, was nominated for the third time for the office of president of the United States by the Democratic national convention at 3.40 o'clock this morning amid scenes of frenzied enthusiasm. The result came after an allnight session which was kept in a constant state of turmoil up to the moment when the Nebraska leader was proclaimed the choice of the convention. The nomination was made on the first ballot the vote standing.

William J. Bryan 892 I-2, Judge George Gray 59 I-2, Governor Johnson 46.

The announcement of the vote was the signal for a wild demonstration, equalling in duration the record breaking display which on Wednesday afternoon greeted the first mention of Mr. Bryan's name in the convention. The scene within the amphitheatre at the moment of the nomination was of stirring animation. From pit to dome the vast building was packed with ten thousand people thinned out in the remotest galleries after hours of waiting through the intense discomforts of a hot night. It was a great spectacle of grand proportions, tier and tier, and gallery on gallery of animated forms, women in white, the men below, many of them coatless, miriads of fans fluttering to combat the stifling heat and close atmosphere, the long pent up exuberant multitude ever ready to spring into feverish outbreaks of enthusiasm and everywhere the blaze of flags, bunting and patriotic devices and the enveloping folds of Old Glory.

The crowd moved into a wild ecstasy at the mention of Bryan in nomination and again when that of Governor Johnson of Minnesota, was presented, but these manifestations paled before the culminating outburst of emotion as the announcement of the Nebraskan's actual nomination made. The whole assemblage rose en masse, waving flags, handkerchiefs, newspapers, hats and coats, anything and everything that hands could lay upon to wave or hurl into the air when a sound poured from these 10,000 throats in exultant yells, cat calls, Commanche warwhoops, with the added din of shrieking horns, the roar of megaphones and the strains of the band playing an exultant anthem.

With the return of order state after state which had at first recorded its vote for Johnson or Grey, fell into line with the overwhelming calm and the nomination was made unanimous by acclamation. When New York was reached the announcement of Chief Murphy, "Seventy eight votes for Bryan," brought out a wild outburst of enthusiasm. The convention adjourned at 3.50 this morning until 1 p. m. after having been in session continuously for more than eight hours.

Fairview, Lincoln, Neb., July 9.—Wm. J. Bryan in the midst of his family and one or two close friends tonight listened by telephone to the wild demonstration which interrupted the speech of I. J. Dunn, nominating him as the Democratic candidate for president. He heard the voice of Sergeant at Arms Martin, the music of the bands and the voices raised in song, by the magic of electricity and refined acoustic, be was part of the convention.

Mr. Bryan said, "I am very much pleased with the platform. It is clear, specific and strong and I am grateful to the committee for the work they have done in stating the issues. I am sure that the platform will greatly strengthen us in the fight upon which we are entering."

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company, according to capital.

A free miner having discovered mineral in place may locate a claim 500 x 500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on a claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2 1-2 per cent on the sales.

PLACER mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2 1-2 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting and not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

1. At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

2. If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader reside upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

3. If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands in Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

### SYNOPSIS OF Coal Mining Regulations

Coal mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-West Territory and British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre, not more than 2,560 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal sub-divisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

Every lessee of coal mining rights which are not being operated shall furnish the district agent of Dominion Lands with a sworn statement to that effect at least once in each year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 an acre.
