THE NEW TAXATION

It is unlikely that the budget pro-
posals of the government will meet
with much opposition. The Do-
minion is at war, and the desire of
all true Canadians is to help finish
it as soon as possible. Money must
be raised to meet the heavy and un-
precedented expenditure, and when
it is raised, and done, increased tax-
ation will never be popular. The
government, it may be said, for the
most part has proceeded along sound
lines. It is seeking to get all it can
from the people who are best able to
afford it. At the same time while
increasing or intensifying taxation
as a whole, it has also had to broad-
en its scope. Many men earning
moderate incomes who heretofore
have paid no direct taxes, will have
now to contribute to the treasury,
and no doubt there will be some
zealous inequalities. But it re-
mains for everyone to put the best
face he can upon the business. The
Union Government was returned to
endure the vigorous prosecution of
the war, and it is too late now to
kick about the cost. It may look to
many just at present that some of
the proposed taxes are in the na-
ture of doubles. For example, a man
say who is earning an income of
three thousand dollars a year may
have invested in a piano, a gram-
ophone or an automobile. He is tax-

By application to the undersigned, contractors may obtain a copy of the plans and specifications for the sum of ten dollars (\$10), which will be refunded on their return in good order.

Each proposal must be accompanied by an accepted bank cheque on a chartered bank of Canada, made payable to the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, for a sum equal to 20 per cent. of tender, which shall be forfeited if the party tendering declines to enter into contract when called upon to do so, or if he fails to complete the work contracted for. The cheques of unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon the execution of the contract.

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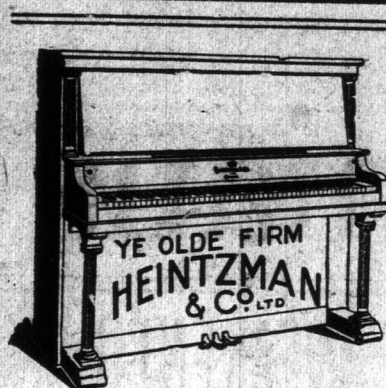
