

TO CONTROL N. S. INDUSTRIES.

New York Capitalists to Over-run the Land of Evangeline.

A Big Scheme by the Vanderbilt Interests.

Building of Railroads and a Steamship Line Included.

NEW YORK, June 11.—The Mail and Express announces the incorporation of the Dominion Securities Co. with a capital of \$1,500,000 and says:

"Capitalists of this city are reaching out to control the commercial and industrial interests of Nova Scotia."

The paper calls this the first step in the direction of permanent control of all Nova Scotia transportation and industrial companies and announces the establishment of a steamship service between this city and Nova Scotia.

Dr. Wm. Seward Webb has been made president of the company and the directors are John Jacob Astor, S. R. Callaway, president of the American Locomotive Co., Edward Vanet, second vice-president of the New York Central and Percy Clemon, president of the Rutland railroad.

"Representatives of the company are already on the scene of the proposed operations," says the paper, "and the first stretch of tracks of the Cape Breton Railroad Extension Co. is being laid. Within four years 600 miles of track will connect Cape Breton with the best mining sections of the country."

"The company has secured the franchises, rights of way, concessions and subsidies which the Dominion of Canada and also the province of Nova Scotia will grant upon the fulfillment of its undertaking. The road now building runs from Yarmouth at the southwestern end of Nova Scotia northwesterly to Halifax and from Port Hawkesbury, on the Straits of Canso, to Louisbourg and Sydney. The company will control the traffic through a section where the Dominion Coal, Iron & Steel plants, in which W. C. Whitney has large holdings, are located."

It was learned on good authority today that this enterprise is a move made by the Vanderbilt railroad interests, which will be felt all over the world. It will open a new line for American commerce and fill the great coal sheds of the entire New York section with an almost unlimited supply from the extensive coal mines of Nova Scotia.

President McKinley Asked to Attend the Carnival to Celebrate the Opening of Black Hills.

CHICAGO, June 12.—President McKinley will receive on next Saturday a unique invitation to attend the Carnival at Deadwood, S. D., beginning on July 3rd, which will celebrate the opening of the Black Hills reservation by white people 25 years ago. The invitation is engraved on a solid gold plate. Will S. Warner of Deadwood, passed through Chicago today on his way to Washington, carrying the invitation. The celebration is expected to prove of great interest in the western states.

MANSON RE-ARRESTED.

Refused Admission into the U. S. by Immigration Authorities.

William Manson of St. John, who for the crime of indecent assault upon a little girl was hawtowed ten days, to which to leave the country, is still in town and is very likely to remain here beyond the time allotted for his departure.

As soon as his sentence was announced last Saturday, the United States immigration officials here at once took measures to prevent the landing of a criminal under suspended sentence upon the soil of their country. Inspectors at the boats and trains were put on their guard, and descriptions of the man were wired to all places along the border where it was in any way probable he might attempt to effect an entrance. So when Manson, faithfully following out his sentence, stepped on board the S. S. State of Maine for the land of the free, Monday morning, he was carefully watched, and as soon as the boat reached Eastport Inspector Hampton apprehended him and placed him in the care of the city marshal until the arrival of the next boat returning.

The prisoner pleaded that he be allowed to proceed, stating that he had only intended to remain in Eastport until he raised some money, when he would return to Canada and locate in the Northwest. But the immigration officials could not see it that way and Manson was sent back to his native city on the S. S. Cumberland, arriving here about seven o'clock last evening.

There were two little girls connected with Manson's unmentionable crime, and it was only for assaulting one of these, Eva Boyne, that he was banished on Saturday. When it became known that he would in all probability be sent back to the city, F. W. Emms, the father of the other victim, proceeded to swear out another warrant for indecent assault, with which, in the hands of Sgt. Kilpatrick and Officer Killen, Manson was confronted as he stepped off the boat last night. Immediately after his arrest he was driven to the central station in a coach and incarcerated there, so it is highly improbable that he will be able to again leave the city before the remaining six days of his probation have elapsed.

GOT A WARM RECEPTION.

Boer Force Finds Homestead Bristling With British Rifles.

KENHART, June 11.—A strong patrol of Border Scouts, under Captain Ramsbotham and Lieutenant Berezford, left here to escort some wagons with stores for Uprington and repair the telegraph line. They completed the task without encountering any opposition, but on their return journey they were attacked by a commando consisting of 100 Boers under Cooroy, who is said to be a Free Stater. The enemy were marching on Kenhart, with the full intention of attacking it. On their way they heard that a patrol of twenty Border Scouts were staying at Marogas. Hoping to annihilate the twenty men without much trouble, they simply stormed the homestead, thus giving our men an opportunity of firing at a range of 100 yards. After an engagement which lasted five hours, fifteen Boers were found dead, and seventeen wounded were taken prisoners. A number of horses, rifles, saddles and cartridges were also captured. Field Cornet Jan Louw was among the wounded. The bullets used by the Boers were mostly of the expanding type.
