French Doctors Have Discovered New Use for Radium.

Use for Radium. Paris, Oct. 9.—Two of the foremost physicians of Paris, Drs. Wickham and begrais, have created a sensation at the Academy of Medicine by a report on their discovery of a method of remov-ing birthmarks by the action of radium. Such marks have hitherto been believed to be indelible. The new method has proved equally successful in cases of adults and children. Marks are effaced by the simule application of a plane sur-

adults and children. Marks are effaced by the simple application of a plane sur-lace covered with a varnish containing radium. The action is regulated by the length and frequency of the applications, which are absolutely painless. The treat-ment may be applied to an infant dur-ing sleep. The doctors add that the bithmarks most easily curued are these ing sleep. The doctors add that the birthmarks most easily cured are those which are most highly colored.


