## Kelvin

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (excluding the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

## LIGHTS OUT AT MONTREAL.

Power Company Serves an Ultimatum on City.

Montreal, Sept. 27.—There is another deadlock between the city and the Power Company over the lighting question. The Montreal Light, Heat & Power Company have launched their ultimatum. All the lights on the city streets will be cut off on Friday, Oct. 1, unless a sum is voted to guarantee the payment of their account to the end of the year. The Finance Committee has refused to grant that sum.

Life in an Oasis.

The opening of a railroad from a point near Luxor into the Libyan desert has rendered easy the approach to the oasis of Khargeh, which is regarded as a typical example of these isolated centers of life. For three years just past H. J. L. Beadnell has resided in this oasis, studying the phenomena of springs, moving sands, wells, and so forth. The Libyan oases are deep depressions in a lofty plateau, which has a maximum elevation of nearly 2,000 feet, but the bottoms of the oases are only from 100 to 300 feet above sea-level. They are underlain by beds of sandstone which are the sources of the water supply. Artesian wells 400 feet deep form practically inexhaustible means of irrigation, and such deep wells have been used from ancient times. The depressions were once the beds of lakes, and the water in the sandstone probably has its sources in the Abyssinian highlands.

London, Sept. 22.—It was reported today that in view of the great success of the fashionable "no tip" Strand Palace Hotel, which has just opened, a string of similar hostelry may be built in all of the capitals of Europe.

## TOOK CHILDREN.

U. S. Immigration Officers' High-Handed Action.

Montreal, Sept. 27.—Mrs. F. H. Baldie, wife of a prominent automobile manufacturer, and former Mayor of Tacoma, left her home to-night, a very indignant woman. Some time ago she sent her two children across the Atlantic to visit relatives. They sailed in charge of the captain of the steamship Grampian. They returned in the captain's charge on the same boat, reaching Quebec on Saturday night. Their mother had come to Montreal to meet them, but when the Grampian arrived here there were no children on board.

Then Mrs. Baldie learned that they had been taken from the ship at Quebec by United States immigration officers, despite the fact that they were traveling first-class, and that that class of passengers is always landed at Montreal. Mrs. Baldie went down to Quebec and found the children in charge of a matron, who willingly turned them over to her. She returned to Montreal, and as she left the train was accosted by another United States immigration officer, who took her and her children in charge.

At the immigration headquarters here she alleged she was put through a sort of third degree, and compelled to answer all sorts of questions, and it was only after she had secured the assistance of Mr. William Stitt, general passenger agent of the C. P. R., to whom she had a letter of introduction, that she was able to secure release from the charge of kidnapping her own children.

Mrs. Baldie says that her husband is going to take the case to Washington.

## BLACK HAND FEAR

Caused a Panic in a New York School.

New York, Sept. 27.—Terrorized by Black Hand stories, 1,000 children stampeded in a Polish parochial school in Jersey City to-day when fireworks were set off in the street below, and in the mad rush for the doors fourteen were crushed, one so seriously that death will probably result. The fatally injured child is Marianna Zelazka, seven years old. The others comprise five little girls and eight boys, all running from seven to ten years old. All are in Jersey City hospitals.

The schoolhouse is a three-story brick building, a stone's throw from an Italian church, which had obtained a permit to set off fireworks during a church celebration to-day. A rumor went out last week among the children in lower Jersey City schools that threats had been made to blow up the schools with dynamite. The children of this school have been particularly nervous about it, and when the bombs went off suddenly they ran shrieking from their recitation rooms into the halls. Cries of dynamite and the Black Hand rang through the building. The calls of the priest in charge had no effect.

The terrified children poured into the halls and rushed wildly down the stairs. There are two street doors, but one of them was closed. A few passed safely out of the open door, but at the closed entrance there occurred a disastrous jam. Here several of the smaller children were trampled into unconsciousness, while others ran back into the building and sprang through open windows fifteen feet to an area way below.

BOYS' CLUB UNION.

At a meeting last evening of the Executive Committee of the Hamilton Boys' Club Union a constitution was drawn up and final arrangements were made for the social evening next Friday. It will be held in Central Methodist Sunday School room (entrance on Rebecca street), and will commence at 7.30.
