MONTREAL, Nov. 18.
The longshoremen went on strike
in a body yesterday, demanding 50
cents an hour, instead of 30 cents, the
present rate. In the final rush to clear
the port. The situation is serious,
as indications are that winter will
set in earlier than usual and insur-
ance contracts expire Nov. 25th.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Nov. 18.

Owing to the decision of the United
States Government to fortify the Pan-
ama Canal, the defences of the Island
of Jamaica will be improved. The
forts commanding the outer channels
of Port Royal and Kingston will be
remodelled and more guns placed
there. When the work is completed
the Island will be one of the most
strongly fortified British possessions.

QUEBEC, Nov. 18.

During a heavy gale and snow
storm Thursday night, the Norwegian
barque Antigua was driven ashore at
Martin River. Capt. Kurize and
eleven of the crew were drowned.
Three were rescued from the wreck.

IN MEMORIAM.

At noon to-day in the peaceful little
cemetery that overlooks the beautiful
Bay of Conception there was laid to
rest the mortal remains of Catherine,
beloved wife of our respected fellow
townsman, D. J. Jackman.

It was the privilege of the writer to
know intimately this remarkable wo-
man and to measure her good quali-
ties of head and heart. Her greatest
characteristics were, devotion to her
religion and the advancement of her
family. In her religious life she was
a model, a type of the old time Irish
Catholic mother. She was strong in
her faith and constant in her atten-
dant to the Chapel. The Rev. Father
McGrath, her spiritual adviser, in a
touching discourse referring to the
loss of the Church of St. Michael's had
sustained by her death, said: "That a
great Church worker had passed
away, and although she was a devoted
wife and mother and a woman of
large business affairs from the first
days of her residence on Bell Island,
even in the very stormiest days of
winter, she never for one day (except
through sickness) was absent from
the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. It
could be truly said of her that her
life was one of work and prayer, and
although her husband and family will
miss a good wife and devoted mother,
yet her life will be an inspiration and
example not only to them but to the
whole community."

At the Requiem Mass the Rev. Fr.

McGrath, P. P., Bell Island, was cele-
brant, Rev. Fr. Geoff. P. P., Portugal
Cove, deacon, Rev. Fr. Kelly, of St.
Patrick's, sub-deacon.

The esteem in which the deceased
was held by the whole community
was evidenced by the presence of the
full choir and the large congregation
of all denominations. There were also
present Magistrate Power, Drs. Car-
mohan and Gough, the Customs Of-
ficials, representatives from the staffs
of the Dominion Iron and Steel Co.
and the Nova Scotia Steel Co., and a
large number of friends from Lancet
Cove and the Mines.

The deceased has a son in Rome,
and a daughter in Montreal, her hus-
band and aged mother and all the
other members of the family were
present at her editing death.—R.I.P.

LONDON, Nov. 17.
A despatch from Tien Tsin says
that the British, French and Russian
troops made separate demonstrations
there to-day by parading the streets.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

The Cheng Tu correspondent of the
Shanghai press says that two foreign
missionaries have been murdered.
One belongs to the American Metho-
dist Mission, and the other to the Cana-
dian Methodist Mission. Both were
stabbed.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

Forty suffragettes interviewed Presi-
dential Asquith at Downing Street yes-
terday and attempted by threats and
proposed renewal of hostilities to ob-
tain a pledge that the Government
would next session of Parliament pass
a bill giving equal suffrage to both
sexes.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

A despatch to Lloyds from Cux-
haven says that the British steamship
St. Bride, bound from Hamburg to
Norfolk Roads, foundered off Schaar
Horn. A lifeboat belonging to the St.
Bride, containing two bodies, was
picked up at sea.

BERNE, Nov. 17.

Violent earth shocks have been ex-
perienced throughout Switzerland. In
Geneva the street cars were derailed.
In this city and in Zurich theatre au-
diences were thrown into the streets.
In the towns along the mountain
slopes the inhabitants fled from their
homes.

HALIFAX, Nov. 17.

The Court Martial has found Navi-
gating Lieut. White guilty of suffer-
ing the Niobe to founder through negli-
gence. He has been sentenced to be
severely reprimanded and be dismis-
sed from the Niobe. On account of
former good conduct he will not be
dismissed from the service or reduced
in rank.

BERLIN, Nov. 17.

An earthquake last night, which was
felt in a wide area of Central Europe,
severely damaged the Castle of Ho-
henzollern Hachingen in Prussia. At
Constance, in the Grand Duchy of
Baden, the spire of the Cathedral, the
most imposing building in the city,
fell. A colossal statue of Germania
which crowned the Post Office build-
ing, tumbled into the street. The
Kingdom of Wurtemberg was shaken
hard.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

Andrew Bonar Law made his first
speech as Unionist leader of the
House of Commons at Leeds. He
called on the Unionists to work with
the object of turning out the Govern-
ment; bidding them to fight against
Home Rule and for Tariff Reform. He
made much of the Government's de-
pendence upon the support of the
Irish party, emphasizing his remarks
by saying, "If there is one National
Ireland, there are two which are sepa-
rated from each other far more
acutely than either is separated from
the English." He urged a tariff as a
means of raising the general level of
wages. Though he did not pretend
that the tariff was a cure for all evils,
he held that it was a help for the
greatest of them, namely, chronic
lack of employment for the work-
men. He dwelt upon the Canadian
elections, which he believed would be
a landmark in the world's history.




