Methodist Conference

AFTERNOON.

The afternoon session opened by singing Hymn 441. Prayer was offered by Rev. T. H. James and Rev. C. A. Blount.

Rev. Dr. Fenwick read the obituary notice of the late Rev. W. P. Scarth, who died last year while in attendance at Toronto University. Mr. Scarth came to Newfoundland from England, and for two years laboured in our Conference. The ex-president, Rev. A. A. Holmes, and Rev. J. T. Newman bore testimony to the sterling Christian character of our departed brother.

Hymn 606 was sung, and Rev. A. A. Holmes and Hon. H. J. B. Woods led in prayer. The order of Conference was again resumed, and Rev. A. F. Newcombe, District Secretary of the Canadian Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society, addressed the Conference on the work of the Society. He expressed his gratitude for the generous support given him, and his appreciation of the hearty reception which was given him by the Conference. He prophesied the coming year to be the most successful year of the Bible Society in Newfoundland, because of the general interest that was manifest among the people.

Conference adjourned at 3.30 p.m. with the Benediction.

EVENING.

The Conference Missionary Meeting was held this evening in George St. Church, the President, Rev. C. Lench, in the chair. Hymn 108 was sung, and after prayer, the President introduced Rev. James Allen, M.A., Secretary of Home Missions. His subject was: "The Essential Unity of all our Connexional Work." He spoke of the Connexional Work under two heads: (1) Missionary, (2) Educational, describing clearly the two kinds of preaching, viz.: (1) Preaching to the congregation, (2) Preaching to the individual. He said there was an obligation upon every member of the congregation to serve the Head of the Church. He asked the question: "Why have a society with many officers such as we have in our missionary work?" and answered it thus: Because the work is wide-world, and therefore the business of these men is to look beyond this Church, this Conference, and get a world-wide vision. Hence the need of organization to marshal the forces of righteousness. The Church, for 100 years, saw they could do it, if they would; now they see they can do it and they will. The problems facing the church are: The scarcity of men—100 men are needed now to fill the pulpits of Canadian Methodism. The Education part of our work deals with the growth and perfecting of Christian character, and that is the aim of all our higher institutions of learning. Young people's societies, Epworth Leagues, etc. The family is the chief field for the layman in which to build up character. The commercial life is manifesting itself, but brain is taking the place of brawn. Physical might is less dangerous than a strong cunning mind. Death comes from clutching; this is characteristic of the selfish spirit.

A solo was then sung by Mr. Ruggles, after which the President asked Mrs. (Rev. Dr.) Rogers for the resume of the work of the Woman's Missionary Society. Mrs. Rogers, who attended a Convention held at Canning, N.S., a few days ago, gave a sketch of the rise and progress of the Society in Canada, Japan, China and Newfoundland, saying that George St. Church was the birthplace of the Society in this Colony.

Hymn 728 was then sung, and the President introduced Rev. Dr. Chown, Superintendent of the Methodist Church of Canada. He confined his remarks to the work of the West, where was the greatest opportunity for missionary effort in the world, and illustrated this by references to the All-People's Mission which is doing so much for character-building in the West. He told of the victories of the Gospel among the Indians, and the uplifting influences manifest among the foreigners who had lately come as dwellers in that land.

Dr. Fenwick gave a short, concise financial statement. There was an increase of \$1,772 over last year, the total amount raised being \$17,489. A collection was taken. Hymn 741 was sung, and Benediction was pronounced by Rev. Dr. Chown.

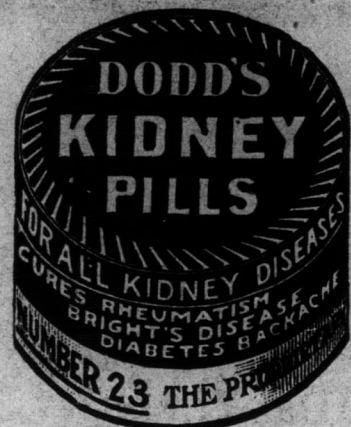

Arab Fighting Girl Inspire to Bravery

Much has been heard in London recently of the exploits in Tripoli of the Amariyehs or Menders, the young Arab girls who are fighting in the desert to stem the Italian invasion but nothing definitely has been learned of this amazon adjunct to the Turkish fighting forces until the return of a correspondent who has been with a large force of Arabs in the desert for some time. The girls are between the ages of sixteen and eighteen, and they derive their name from their duties, which are to mend the courage of the failing, to rebuke the wavering and inspire the brave. They also bring water to the thirsty in the foremost ranks of the warriors, and in performing this service many girls have lost their lives. They are the best substitutes that the Arabs have for Red Cross nurses and they bear the dead as well as the living from the battle field, another service which has taken toll in many of their lives.

King George's New Coach.

The King's new coach, a matchless piece of British workmanship, has been taken to Buckingham Palace from Barker & Co.'s, in South Audley street, Mayfair. This is no rival of the massive gilded coach, which appears on occasions of fullest state. It is lighter and less gorgeous. The body is dark in color, but the panels are made splendid by the full royal arms. A finely carved rail around the top of the coach takes the form of rose, thistle, shamrock and palm, the latter being emblematic of the empire. The same design figures upholstery of the interior. A magnificent blue and scarlet hammer cloth, with gold tassels and borders, covers the driver's seat. Every bit of the material is British except the panels of Honduras mahogany. The frame is of British ash and from first to last the coach took 12 months to build. It takes the place of the one that was burned a year ago, and will doubtless be used at the coming levee. Its builders have been coachmakers for 200 years.

Relics of Edward VII.

Many articles of unique historical interest, which belonged to the late King Edward, have been sent by Queen Alexandra to the London Museum, which will be opened to the public shortly. The most interesting of these is a watch-chain which His Majesty used to wear, made of Queen Alexandra's own hair. To the chain, which is studded with diamonds, is attached the following inscription: Watch-chain of H. M. Queen Alexandra's own hair, and given by her to King Edward VII. in 1894.

In the same case are a medallion and ribbon each of the three different classes of the Victoria and Albert Order. This order, like the Garter, is returned to the Sovereign at the death of the holder, and those in question were returned to King Edward. They were bestowed upon Lady Codrington, the Queen of Hanover, and the Countess Spencer. Near by are King Edward's favorite cigar and cigarette cases and his cigar-box. The collection is completed with several pairs of gloves worn by His Majesty on special occasions, and also a favorite woollen muffler.
