LONDON, Aug. 23.
General Booth's body to-day lies in state at his late residence at Hadley Wood. At Congress Hall, Clapton, plans for the lying in state will be the same as those when the body of Mrs. Catherine Booth, the "Army's Mother," lay in state. The coffin will lie on the same spot, over which a huge canopy hangs. At the side of the coffin will be the portrait of his wife. Flags of all nations will adorn the walls, representative of the vast extent of the Army's operations. Throughout the day a stream of callers passed in to the late General's modest residence. Nothing about the exterior of the two-storied villa indicated the presence of death. The blinds were drawn down only in the windows of the small bedroom, containing a single brass bedstead on which the General's body lay, clad in full dress uniform of black with red jersey. Above the bed drooped the Army's flag. At the head hung the flag which General Booth had carried on his visit to Calvary when he toured Palestine in 1905. Messages of condolence have been received from the Queen Mother, Alexandra, King Christian of Denmark, Louis Botha, Lord Islington, Lord Rosebery and many others of world prominence.

LONDON, Aug. 23.
In a message to Scotlandists throughout the world published to-day, General Bramwell Booth indicates the direction of the Army's coming activities. He speaks confidently of its future. He says the Army's reorganization and achievements are the outcome of God's Spirit, which cannot die. It still vivifies us. Though the Spirit does not change, the forms and methods with which it is clothed must change. New methods must be employed, and new channels of activity opened to keep pace with human advancement. Asked whether the Army would still be governed on military lines, the General replied that it would, because military discipline gives a tremendous cohesion of simplicity and power to the organization, of a similar kind to that displayed by the Roman Catholic Church. Speaking generally, he confessed that he would rejoice in the decline of the Army, if the Spirit left it. "I should in brief, be for not keeping dead things above ground."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.
John D. Archbold to-day told the Senate Committee investigating the Campaign Funds, that the Standard Oil Company's \$125,000, contributed to the Republican war chest in 1904, was made upon assurances from Cornelius N. Bliss that the contribution was acceptable to Roosevelt, and that further contributions would be acceptable. Members of the Committee conferred over the advisability of inviting Roosevelt to testify.

LONDON, Aug. 23.
The Times correspondent at Andrievitzka, Montenegro, telegraphs the destruction of Christian villages near Berana. Albanian, continuing Eleven villages have been burned, and acts of barbarism have been committed by Turkish soldiers. No Moslem villages have been destroyed.

The British steamer, Queen Alexandra, and the Norwegian Corona were in collision to-day off this port. Both vessels were damaged, but to what extent is not known.
