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### At the House.

Monday, May 1st, 1916.

Practically all the business of the Assembly Chamber was finished yesterday, the order paper being gone through.

The Prime Minister moved the suspension of the rules regarding all matters to come before the House.

The Municipal Bill passed through Committee, received its third reading and was sent to the Legislative Council for concurrence. The Bill provides for the election of Mayor and Councilors for two years in June and the plebiscite on the Ward system at the end of September. The Premier pointed out that the Bill was the unanimous report of the Select Committee of both Houses.

The House then went into Committee on a Bill to regulate the Censorship of Moving Pictures and went through with a few verbal amendments. The rest of the Bill was emended by Mr. Cliff, Mr. Higgins, Mr. Downey and Mr. Lloyd, the latter pointing out that whilst it was true that there was rarely anything of an objectionable nature shown here, censorship was necessary not only from a moral standpoint, but also from a patriotic, as he had seen displayed here offensive pictures, which emanated from a German source and which were offensive and insulting to a British audience. The pictures referred to were brought in to being in the United States and would cater to the taste of Germans and Sinn Feiners.

The Revenue and Death Duties Bill went through their various stages.

The House went into Committee on a Loan Bill for the raising of five million dollars for the following purposes:—One million to pay back the British Bankers for the temporary loan borrowed two years ago for railway construction; three million for war expenditures and one million to meet obligations of the Colony on account of temporary loans from the Bank of Montreal. The Minister of Finance, the introducer of the Bill, indicated that the War Loans would meet all expenditures up to the end of April 1917, also that they would bear interest at 5 1/2 per cent. The custom of making borrowings in London was to be departed from this year, the Minister said, and the loans may be floated either in the United Kingdom, United States or locally.

Mr. Lloyd suggested at this stage that the opportunity was afforded the Government to make a statement he promised in reference to railway extension estimates.

The Premier stated that according to the Estimate of the Government Expenditure it will cost \$574,000 to finish the branch railways, excepting Bonne Bay, and the estimated cost of Bonne Bay branch was \$704,000.

Mr. Lloyd said that it was unfortunate that the Minister of Finance had seen fit to delay this Loan Bill to

the last days of the session. He thought that matters so important and which affected the Colony so vitally should not come under suspended rules and therefore could not complete the Minister on introducing the Bill. Continuing, Mr. Lloyd showed that the five million dollars to be raised was to pay old debts and to replace money already spent to the extent of 3 1/2 millions and 1 1/2 millions was to meet expenditures to be incurred between now and the meeting of the Legislature next year in connection with the war. He pointed out that it was the intention of the Government to raise one million dollars to repay the bankers on account of railway extension, though that was not mentioned in the Bill. When this money is raised there will still be authority, said Mr. Lloyd, under this Legislature, to raise two million dollars for railways purposes. The estimates of the Government Engineer as submitted by the Leader of the Government show that 1 1/2 millions would be all that is required for the full completion of the railways and he (Mr. Lloyd) considered it strange to ask for three-quarters of a million more than was wanted.

The Premier replied that the Opposition may have to act under these powers.

Mr. Lloyd said the Premier had let the "cat out of the bag" by saying that it was necessary to keep full authority of raising two millions in addition to the million dollars provided for in the Bill. Regarding the War Loan Mr. Lloyd said it was our contribution to the Empire and dealt with the splendid response of the call to the arms and stated that 700 volunteers had been attested since the new recruiting campaign was launched a couple of months ago. He referred to the fact that other fields than London had to be looked to raise money. He thought it wise provision if the Government would encourage the people of this country by offering them sufficient inducement in the way of interest in the loans, but in that connection a big task had to be done and that was to get the confidence of the people.

The Premier replied shortly to Mr. Lloyd's remarks.

Mr. Prescott gave notice that he would introduce a bill for the manufacturing of cod oil for medicinal purposes.

The House then adjourned.

### Constable Simmonds Rises to the Occasion.

Dear Sir:—For three or four months the citizens of St. John's were, to a certain extent (the females especially) terrorized over the repeated burglaries that took place in this city, and many were under the impression that the police force were becoming incompetent to deal with matters of this kind, more especially as the perpetrator exhibited such ingenuity and audacity that marked him, in the estimation of the public, as an old practitioner, or to give it the professional title—an expert.

Our best detective talent was placed on the job, but week after week went by, further robberies were committed, and the daily appointed clerks reported "nothing doing"—they were baffled. Many of us citizens were under the impression that a professional crackman from New York, Chicago, or some other large city was amongst us, as we knew of none of the suspects in our community who were so well up in the "profession" as to continue their nefarious work without detection.

At last that unassuming, but keen and energetic officer, Constable John Simmonds, unravelled the mystery, thus proving that he possesses tact, discrimination, as well as undoubted bravery in case of emergency. I say discrimination advisedly, because Constable Simmonds ran considerable risk in making an arrest of a youth who was known to be a telegraph messenger, whose duty called him to all localities at all hours. Such a youth would be held above suspicion by ninety-nine out of a hundred policemen. But Simmonds took no chances, or, in other words, in local parlance, gave no soft tricks. He kept his quarry in sight, and captured him in the act—thus removing a cause of annoyance and terror from the minds of our citizens, as we did not know whose turn would come next, or the bold burglar to pay us a visit. The particulars of the repeated robberies have been so well ventilated through the newspapers for three or four months that it is unnecessary for me to go into details, suffice it to say that seldom in our history have robberies been carried out so successfully and repeatedly without detection, or which produced such a sensation in the community.

Well, Mr. Editor, Constable Simmonds unravelled the mystery, and did it clear and simple, a skill that proves that he is as well qualified to use his mental faculties and discrimination upon such an occasion, as he would be to use his knuckles upon emergency, if driven to extremity. Now the question arises, the public are under a deep obligation to Const. Simmonds for the skill and determination displayed in capturing the youthful unsuspected thief, but what about the authorities? Are they going to recognize the services of this efficient officer? It is unnecessary for me to say that others, during years past, have received full recognition for services rendered, both in monetary as well as official recognition, but seldom, in our city, has anxiety been dispelled from the minds of our house-keepers and business men, as when Simmonds rose to the occasion, and placed the young buccaneer in the refugee precarum, down by the banks of historic Quidi Vidi, to meditate at leisure over his past acts, and make a firm resolution to sin no more. I shall watch this matter with interest, and so will many others, who like to see a man rewarded according to his merits in duty well and faithfully performed.
