People have to get rid of their slop water and kitchen refuse, and for want of a better means of disposal empty it into the cobble-tone side drains.

I write in the present tense because there are still unfortunately a few places still in that condition, but the great majority of them have been cleaned up.

The time of the Sanilary staff thus sayed is now devoted. tary staff thus saved is now devote to the regular sweeping and cleaning of the town, and I think the results are evident. One other great improvement in

this connection was effected by the Board—the sale of night soil for fertilizing purposes, a practice so can-gerous to health and so repugnant to one's ideas, was absolutely stopped.
