

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Scotch-cured, would do well to con-sider the cost of merchandising salt fish in a market sufficiently far away so that producers cannot keep in immediate touch with conditions throughout the season. In the first instance the freight rate between Newfoundland and New York is \$1.80 per barl. Insurance with war risk included would bring this amount up to \$2 or more. Goods arriving in warm weather must be kept in cold storage at a cost of 25 cents a month after a trucking charge has been paid. For each barrel entering cold storage in New York there is a fixed charge of six cents, and when a barrel is taken out for inspection its cost is three cents If the barrel is sold and is not returned to storage at all, but if it be returned, an additional 3 cents is charged. Most herring is kept in cold store in New York at least 4 months in every year. Added to these costs of doing business is the overhead office and selling cost, and interest or investment, all of which vary according to merchant. But it is definitely known that a barrel of herring from Newfoundland, sold originally for \$8, represents to the New York handler a minimum investment of \$11.50 if it is not sold within three months. Add to this his profit and an operator must get more than \$12.50 to make 10 per cent. And let it be known that the New York market seldom pays more than this figure for ordinary Scotch cured herring, of which there is a preinance always. Especially fancy goods sometimes bring up to \$16 and \$18 per barrel, but this, of course, reresents a larger first cost than the egular run of stock .--- Fishing Gatte, Nov. 18.
