City Council Meets.

The regular weekly session of the City Council took place last night. Permission was asked by A. Harvey and Co. to build a temporary shed for the protection of U. S. Admiralty coal on their premises. The matter was referred to the Engineer.

Mr. W. Campbell, Hamilton Street, praised the work of the Council employees in that section.

In the Fitzpatrick-Duff case, the Solicitor reported that the Council was not liable for damage resulting from an overflow from natural drainage. The Solicitor also reported on the houses illegally built in Hunt's Lane many years ago and to repair which Mr. H. Blatch asked permission at last meeting. An argument followed, Councillors Morris and Mullaly urging that the request be granted, as the owner had guaranteed to make brick foundations and put them in sanitary condition, also pointing out that 8 families were to be thrown on the street owing to an unjust law being on the Statute Book. It was ultimately decided that the law must be carried out.

The City Engineer suggested that rock crushing begin in the East End as early as possible. The suggestion was agreed upon, but he must find out if the staff is capable of doing more work than last year before proceeding.

Thos. Lake bought a piece of land belonging to Woods' Estate in the East End and asked if he could build thereon. He will have to submit plans of contemplated building. Several other minor matters were attended to.

Herring Fishery at Bay of Islands.

There was good herring fishing at Goose Arm the last of the week. On Saturday boats had from fifteen to twenty tubs per haul.

At North Arm there was a scarcity of herring most of last week. But along the outer part of the North Shore boats had good hauls when the weather permitted the hauling of gear.

On the whole, however, the herring fishing in Bay of Islands last week was not so good as the previous weeks.

On Friday and Saturday the best herring fishing in Bay of Islands, was off Green Island, where in one day a few boats secured one hundred and fifty barrels.

Off Green Island on Saturday there

were from five to ten tubs per boat. In the herring fishery was brisk in Middle Arm on Monday, boats getting from five to ten barrels per feet.

The price of herring throughout Bay of Islands on Monday was \$8 per barrel from the nets.

AT BONNE BAY.

Something over 200 barrels of herring were taken at Bonne Bay on Monday, which found a ready sale at \$5.75 per barrel.

Yesterday, owing to stormy weather, Bonne Bay boats were unable to haul their gear set outside, but inside gear yielded four tubs per boat.

The schr. Flaherty is still at Bonne Bay loading salt bulk herring.

On Monday nine dollars per barrel was offered at Bonne Bay for pickled round herring.—Western Star, Dec. 5.

Men From Nfld. Ordained Yesterday.

First Time in Eighty Years—An Historic Service at All Saints, With Sermon by Rev. H. W. Cunningham.

Halifax, Dec. 3.—In the course of his sermon, yesterday, in All Saints Cathedral, upon the occasion of the ordination of five men from Newfoundland and two from the Diocese of Nova Scotia to the ministry, Rev. H. W. Cunningham paid a very fine tribute to the "Ancient Colony" and emphasized in a deeply interesting way the quite historic character of the beautiful service it was 80 years ago, in the year in which our late beloved Queen, "Victoria the Good," ascended the throne, that there last took place in Halifax an ordination of candidates for the Ministry from Newfoundland—Hamilton and Howell, Bishop John Inglis, so long since joined the company of heaven, officiated at that service, both the men ordained taking up work in Newfoundland. Two years later it was created an independent Diocese, Archdeacon Spencer, of Bermuda, being appointed its first Bishop. He, however, resigned in 1843, because his constitution would not stand the climate—this, he affirmed, would require a stomach insensible to attacks of seasickness, pedestrian powers greater than those of an Irish goose, and other physical powers which this Bishop from the south did not possess. Bishop Field, his successor, did not, however, find it so; this beloved Bishop, known as "the apostle of the fishermen," held the office for 33 years, Bishop Kelly, his coadjutor Bishop succeeding him and holding office for a year, to be succeeded by Bishop Jones, who after 40 years of splendid service, resigned only the other day. It is interesting to realize that of the 73 years that Newfoundland has been an independent Diocese, Bishops Field and Jones have together had bishoprics for a period of 73 years. The father of the rector of St. George's was ordained by Bishop Field, and he himself by Bishop Jones, his nephew, Victor, being one of yesterday's candidates.

The candidates were presented by Canon Bolt, Canon Vernon acting as Chaplain to His Grace. The Dean took the Litany.

In the evening Canon Bolt preached in St. George's a very strong sermon, in the course of which he paid fine tribute to the rector—at this service all the Newfoundland candidates were in the chancel.

The Question of Repairs Again.

Following the regular business of the City Council last night Secretary Slatery reported that a few days ago the occupier of a house complained to him that the ferment in which he lived was in a leaky condition and having failed in his attempt to get the owner to make repairs, he appealed to the Council to act in the matter. The agent for the property was notified by the Secretary to make repairs, and that he was liable to a fine of \$5 a day for every day's neglect in complying with the law. The tenant had since called at the office and complained that the owner had increased his rent one hundred per cent. After hearing the Secretary's report a lengthy discussion followed in which the Mayor, Councillors Mullaly, Taft and Vinnicombe took part, and with the exception of Councillor Mullaly, who did not agree with the principle of making landlords responsible for houses occupied by tenants, it was decided to carry out the law in these cases, and in the event of its being proved that a tenant is made suffer for asking Council's protection, when refused by the owner, the latter will be severely dealt with.
