The article under the caption of "Viciousness," which we published yesterday, inadvertently contained several typographical errors, and consequently we feel that it should be re-published to-day in its correct form:

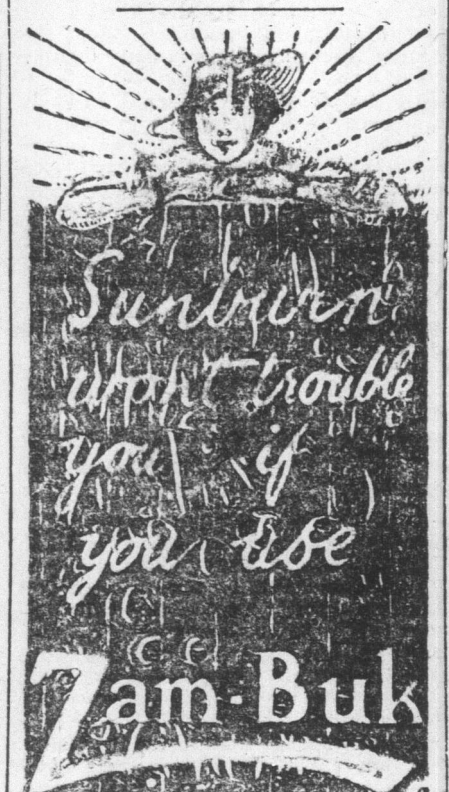
VICIOUSNESS.
Amongst the amazing incidents which have recently come to light growing out of Coakerism—and not the least amazing—are the circumstances concerning the Lighthouse at Tickle Point, Green Bay.

This Lighthouse was originally erected at Fox Head, in 1915, upon the suggestion of Capt. Job Kneeb. It was changed to Tickle Point in 1918 at the demand of the Union Council. Mr. W. H. Waterman was appointed Keeper of the Fox Head Light in 1915, and dismissed without cause in 1918, when one John Fooks was appointed.

The Light on Tickle Point was built on land owned by Fooks, and the Bill of Sale included this provision:

"The vendor is to be appointed 'Keeper of Tickle Point Light,' at 'the salary allowed for that purpose, \$150.00 per annum. This 'appointment to last during good 'behaviour and satisfactory conduct on his part, and his interest 'therein to terminate with his 'death, retirement, or dismissal 'for cause.'"

There was, of course, no power in the Executive Council to make such an appointment for good behaviour; and, it is safe to say that there is no other instance in our Colonial history in which land was paid for by such a provision, which was mere subterfuge for the purpose of preventing the dismissal of the man under such circumstances as had led to the dismissal of his predecessor.



Tribute to Haig.

LONDON, July 31.
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Marshal Foch paid a remarkable tribute to Field Marshal Haig, during the course of his address after the freedom of the City of London had been bestowed on him yesterday. Generalissimo said he spared more than any other the lives of his men. What interviews we had during these last six months! Foch, a north and from the south, and despite great distances and fatigue we sought each other like two big brothers, in order to live in the closest intimacy and to ensure an absolute community of ideas the more rapid march of our armies. On November 9th I sent Field Marshal Haig the following telegram: "The organized enemy, owing to repeated attacks, is giving way along the whole front. It is essential to maintain and accelerate our operations. I call upon the energy and initiative of the commanders in chief and their armies, in order to secure and render decisive the results obtained." Marshal Foch concluded: "Let us salute the glorious dead, who sleep in France. Faithfully, piously and jealously we shall guard them and keep their memory alive because to us they are a testimony and a pledge."
