The regular weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held on Thursday evening, at eight o'clock. The Mayor presided and all the Councillors were present.

After the preliminary business of

houses was ordered to be gone on with. Decided to advertise that four houses are still available on Quidi Vidi Road, nearly ready for occupation, for approximately \$2,000.00.

The Secretary was authorized to see the Manager of the Savings Bank. regarding the proposed increase of interest on a small loan, made at that Bank, some years ago.

The Secretary of the Public Works Dept. requested permission to nave a light placed in front of the Post Office Building, on Water Street City Engineer, to give the proper location. City Engineer was also authorized to report on the, application for a light in front of Wesley Church.

J. C. Wheeler offered \$500.00 down and \$250.00 yearly for one of the houses on Quidi Vidi Road. This is to be figured up.

A lengthy communication was received from the Gas Co., showing the amount of money they had naid as a coal Tax, and dividends they had paid for a certain number of years, the expenditure on Capital Account from the year 1910-1919 and further expenditure is necessary. They also dealt with the manner in which the streets were opened for repairs to gas mains. The Council will take the whole matter into consideration, with the possibility of effecting a compromise

J. M. Tobin, Sec. of the Hockey League, wrote that the hockey matches were not subjected to a Tax, as no profit was derived from them.

W. A. B. Slater wrote as to water main in front of his bouse, and asked attention to same. Inspector Rooney is to be instructed to attend to this. as well as to seeing that lavatories are installed in certain houses on Water Street South

L. M. Trask, 140 Water Street, applied for a permit to install an electric motor. Matter stood over. Decided, on the application of A. E. Carter, to have some work done to the piling which supports the road near Sim's property, King's Bridge. The following permits were order ed to be granted M. E. Martin, to erect a fence on Freshwater Road; Baird & Co., to erect a garage on Monkstown Road; A. G. Barnes to build addition for S. G. Collier, Ham-

ilton Street; S. M. Hall, to extend kitchen, Bates' Hill. The following plans were approved -House for Mrs. Smith, New Gower Street; Archibald Hicks, house Prince of Wales Street, provided water and sewerage are installed: house W. T Penney, Merrymeeting Road; Fred. Emerson, septic tank for his house

An application was read from Jas. Ellis, respecting a porch, etc., South Side. Matter to be looked up.

Ordered that a full report be made as to the application of R. S. Piercey, for a house on Steven Street. Ill deeds and block plan to be secured from M. A. Shea, for a proposed house on Water Street. The plan of B. Bowering, for building for the Gospel Mission on New Gower Street, was held over. Decided to refer it to the Inspector of Police, as Council do not care to take responsibility of permitting a structure in such a congested locality without the consent of the Head of the Fire Depart-

Engineer is also to examine and report on conditions Sudbury Street. Decided to put light opposite Pool House gate, and alter bracket on Water Street light. Eugineer also to look into the application of Mr. Pierce Pelley, respecting the drain near Macklin Place.

The Solicitor reported that attention would be given to the claims against Kenneth Prowse, and Messrs. Slater and Byrne. The matter of fines in the Magistrate's Court that should come to the Council, will be looked


