Fishermen who have parcels unsold are wondering if the dollar was dropped to pay the increase granted to the fish handlers.

Legislative Council.

The Council met at 4 p.m. The Bills entitled: "An Act to amend Chapter 172 of the Consoli-Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series), entitled "Of the Survey of Foreign-going and Labrador Vessels;" "An Act to provide for the better obtaining of Information respecting the Cod Fishery;" "An Act to amend Chapter 176 of the Conslidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series), entitled "Of the Encouragement of Shipbuilding;" "An Act to amend Chapter 183 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series), entitled "Of the Management and Control of the Harbor of Grand Bank," passed the third reading. The Bill entitled, "An Act to amend Chapter 4 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series) entitled, "Of Legislative Disabilities and the Vacation of Seats in the House of Assembly," was deferred from the Committee stage. The following bills passed the

Committee stage without amendment: "An Act to Provide for the Lighting of Outport Streets;" "An Act to amend Chapter 86 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series), entitled "Of Stipendiary Magistrates and Justices of the Peace." The Bill entitled, "An Act to amend Chapter 27 of the Conslidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series), entitled "Of Death Duties," passed the Committee stage with amendment. The Bill entitled, "An Act Concerning the Registration of Midwives," was amplified in the committee stage at the suggestion of Hon. Dr. Campbell, by adding the words "The Governor in Council may apply these rules to such part or parts of the Colony as he thinks fit." The Bill will be read a third time at next

The Bills entitled, "An Act for the Confirmation of a Contract with the Susu Shipping Company Limited; An Act to amend Chapter 137 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundand (Third Series) entitled "Of the Fire Patrol," passed the committee stage without amendment. The second reading of Bills entitled, "An Act to amend the Income War Tax Act, 1918;" and "An Act to Check Profiteering," was deferred.


