Geddes Asks Canada to Build a "Golden Bridge."

Sympathy And Understanding to be Used in Construction--British Miners' Strike Called For Saturday, 25th--Poles Negotiating With Anti-Bolsheviks--Franco-Hungarian Commercial Treaty Signed--Channel Swim Too Much For Women.

CANADA'S PART IN PEACE BUILDING.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2. Canada must take her place, for which she is fortunately situated, in building the "golden bridge of sympathy and understanding, between the British Empire and the United States, over which will be passed chains of ignorance and angry misrepresentation. If successful that bridge will be the first essential step on the highway toward world peace. We can then face the future with confidence, that must be dealt with before the world returns to peace. If the bridge failed, it would mean that the English speaking nations then it would be a foolhardy man who would look for any peace in the future. There would be collapse of civilization and the world would be a wasteland of long and dark nights. Canada's responsibilities and opportunities are enormous and glorious. You will take charge of the world which we must build that bridge which we must build to safety and prosperity in the future." This was the message left by the members of the Canadian Association, whose luncheon was addressed to-day by Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador to the United States.

By Polish and South Russian forces are going on between the Government here and General Baron Wrangel. Co-operation between Poles and Ukrainians is declared to be a grave menace to Bolsheviki, and it is said the latter have shown their appreciation of this by offering important concessions to Poland at the expense of Lithuania.

FRANCO-HUNGARIAN TREATY. PARIS, Sept. 2. Signature of a treaty between France and Hungary relative to commerce between the two countries is announced here by the Matin. This convention, it is declared, will stipulate that in case of military necessity the two countries will assure protection of the Danube navigation.

WHEAT MOVES UPWARD. CHICAGO, Sept. 2. Wheat took an upward swing in price to-day after a hesitating start. Strength, which developed, was ascribed to prospects of continued good export demand. Selling pressure ceased when it became apparent that offerings were being quickly absorbed.

TURCO-ARMENIAN ARMISTICE. CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 2. Turkish Nationalists have proposed an armistice with the Armenians until President Wilson has defined the latter's boundaries, it is announced here. The Supreme Council of Allies, on recognizing the independence of Armenia on April last, left to President Wilson the settlement of the boundary of the new state.

POLES ADVANCING. PARIS, Sept. 2. Poles have occupied Beryn in Lithuania, east of Suwalki, for strategic reasons, the Foreign Office announced to-day. The Poles also are advancing beyond Suwalki for the same reason, it was added.

ANOTHER STRIKE. MEXICO CITY, Sept. 2. Thirty-one thousand workers, mostly mill hands, went on strike here yesterday, and it is feared the strike will spread to street car men.

A WATERMELON PARADISE. BALTIMORE, Sept. 2. Watermelons are being sold here at two cents each. The pier is crowded with boats of every description loaded with melons that cannot be sold. More than a hundred and fifty thousand have been placed on the market here in the last two days. The price has ranged from two dollars to ten dollars per hundred.

RED ARMY STILL ACTIVE.

PARIS, Sept. 2. A Moscow wireless message, picked up at Paris, attempts to minimize the Russian Bolshevik defeat. It says the Poles seem to forget that in their retreat from Beresina to the Vistula, they lost many prisoners and cannon. The Red army has been compelled to retreat certain distance, but, adds the message, its strength is unbroken and it possesses great reserves of men and material resources.

MESWENEY WORSE. LONDON, Sept. 2. Mayor Mesweeney was reported worse this evening. His sister, upon leaving the prison at eight o'clock to-night, said that for the first time he was unable to speak to her.

REJECTS BOLSHEVIKI PROPOSAL. BERLIN, Sept. 2. Dr. Walter Simons, Foreign Minister, told the Reichstag Foreign Affairs Committee to-day that after mature consideration, he had rejected the proposal that Germany join with the Bolsheviki in combination against the Western Powers in an endeavour to break the bonds imposed by the treaty of Versailles.

CHANNEL ATTEMPT FAILS. LONDON, Sept. 2. For the second time a woman has attempted to swim the English Channel and failed. Mrs. Arthur Hamilton, daughter of the late Sir Charles and Lady Fairlie Cunningham, started from St. Margarets Bay last night at six o'clock, with Cape Crishez, near Calais, as her objective. This morning she was forced to abandon the attempt near South Goodwin Sands. Mrs. Hamilton was the first woman to make the trial since Annet Kellerman failed fifteen years ago.

THE MINERS' DISPUTE. SCRANTON, P.A., Sept. 2. While many mine workers throughout the Hard Coal Fields remained on "vacation" as a protest against the terms of the award of the Anthracite coal commission, the Scale Committee, representing operators and miners, meet to-day for the purpose of finally accepting the award after six months of negotiation.

PRINCE ON WAY TO PANAMA. HONOLULU, Sept. 2. H.M.S. Renown with the Prince of Wales aboard cleared for Panama last night.

Local Naturalists. Greatly Excited Over Amazing Find. Local and other naturalists will be very interested in the recent discovery of a mammoth elephant in the "Stream." The colour is a neutral grey though the find is classified as a white elephant. The "Lobelia" was taken over by the Government of Newfoundland on June 18th, according to her log, and two days later started for her present resting place--mid-stream, St. John's Harbor. How long she will remain there Providence (and the Minister of Shipping) only knows. Her purchase is another of the absurd things carried out by the Government, for on her trip here, though she never exceeded half-speed, she showed that she was able to burn coal; her average consumption would be about 40 tons per day, at an average speed of 15 knots per hour. Although built in 1914 the "Lobelia" was not commissioned until about the early spring of 1918, when for eight months she was employed on patrol duty in the North Sea. She is fitted with two four-inch guns, one forward and the other aft, along with two 2-inch q's. Two powerful search lights are also part of her war-like array, while she also possesses everything a modern boat should possess in the way of electric appliances for steering, signalling and the like. On the whole one wonders what is the use of her here?--Com.

The French banking schooner St. Marie arrived in port last evening in a leaky condition for repairs. The S.S. Canadian Miner arrived this morning with general cargo from Montreal, to the Furness Withy Co. Schr. Jean Wakely, 25 days from Setubal with a cargo of salt to A. H. Murray & Co., arrived last night. Schr. President Coaker has cleared from Exploits with 2,535 barrels of split herring from the Union Trading Co., for Halifax. It is expected the French banker St. Jacques, which put into port a few days ago leaking, will have to land part of her fish cargo and have her topsides caulked.
