Floor Collapses

at An Auction.

While the extensive collection of paintings, sketches, and rare prints of Lord Eldin was being brought to sale at 16, Picardy Place, Edinburgh, on March 16, 1833, a very serious accident ensued. The fame of his col-lection had attracted a great crowd of men and women of taste and letters, and when the auctioneer was in the act of disposing of a famous Teiners, which had been a special favourite of Lord Eldin, the floor of the drawingroom gave way. From eighty to a hundred persons—ladies as well as gentlemen-were precipitated in one mass into an apartment below, filled with china and articles of virtu. The cries and shricks, intermingled with exclamations and ejaculations of distress, were heartrending; but what added to the unutterable agony of that awful moment was the density of the cloud of dust, impervious to the rays of light, producing total darkness, diffusing a choking atmosphere which nearly stifled the terrifled multitude, and in this state of suspense they remained for several minutes. Amongst the mass of people who went down with the floor were Lord Moncrieff, Sir James Riddell, of Ardnamurchan, and Sir Archibald Campbell of Succoth. Many persons were most severely injured, and Mr. Smith, banker, of Money Place-on whom the hearthstone fell—was killed.
