The Story of My Life

WRITTEN BY NEWFOUNDLAND'S FOREMOST SON.

I was born. Of that there is not an atom of doubt, for I possess a birth certificate, and the files of the Daily News and Telegram which bear eloquent testimony to my achievements. Of my boyhood days, I have little to say save that from an early age I gave evidence of that brilliant pendant for muddling which I later brought to a wonderful degree of success. The interests of my fellow countrymen always appealed to me, and it is not, therefore, surprising that the great idea of forming a Fishermen's Protective Union should have evolved in my extraordinary mind. To say that this Union was a success is to throw but little credit on my achievement, which has caused an ardent admirer to write of me as "The greatest and most romantic figure produced by Newfoundland to this day."

True there are such men as Sir William Goode but what is the conduct of the affairs of 'Austria in comparison to any efforts in connection with my union. "Sum Cuique" was the motto I selected and as a Latin dictionary, which I once discovered propping up a window in a disused house, informs me, this means "To every man his own." It is because I believe in this motto and because I feel it incumbent upon me to take all the credit that others will not give me, that I write this autobiography. Now, feeling that I was destined for great things, I formed a political party and accidentally contributed in no small degree, to the defeat at the polls in 1913, of Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond with whom I was allied. As I and six of my friends were then elected, we decided that we would sit in the House for the purpose of keeping a watchful eye on the Government of the day. My ability for constructive criticism was frequently demonstrated in the stormy times which followed. Then came the war and the National Government was formed, of which I was naturally asked to become a member. Having nothing to do at the time, I accepted the offer of a cabinet seat, but was later made the subject of a vile political trick, which threw me and my party into the gloomy shades of Opposition where I remained until 1919.

I have many sides to my character and one of these is the

ability to know a good thing when I see it. I therefore joined the Liberal-Reform Party and was returned to the House of Assembly at the head of 10 men all good men and true to me and my political ambitions. Then I conceived the idea of the Fishery Regulations, which I presented to the House in a speech lasting two hours. Ah, what a relief it was to me, who saw things with a vividness and brightness that seared my spirit and left scars that burn to this day, to pour out my soul in words of inexpressible sweetness—was I not always a thrilling orator? My hearers sat amazed. But one of them failed to listen to the charms of my voice, and the whole House, with this solitary exception, put my Regulations through. And then, the debacle. Solidarity was the crying need and despite the fact that such genius as mine has never before been seen, this solidarity failed to solidate, and my plans were wrecked on the stormy seas of political opposition. Alas, alas, but these were sorry days. I am too full of grief to write further. I cannot trust myself to put pen to paper without splashing the page with the great tears that trickle down my cheek, and fall on my desk with sickening thud. No more, no more.

ENTERED OFFICES BY CLIMBING FIRE ESCAPE.

Two Fish Cargoes Sold.

MR MUNN GETS FAIR PRICES.

Yesterday it was reported that Mr. W. A. Munn had sold his two cargoes of Labrador fish which he sent to Gibraltar by steamers last month for orders. The two ships the *Treas* and *Bing* both loaded at Flat Islands, and carried between them a total of 26,800 quintals. They were amongst the first shipments across and one steamer has been sent to Greece, while the other cargo has been sold in Italy. Speaking to a Telegram reporter, Mr. Munn confirmed the statement that he had disposed of his cargoes at fair prices. Asked if he had to accept barter, in the case of the Greek cargo, Mr. Munn replied that he has plenty of currants, which will be sold at lowest prices. He added that it was a pitiful state of affairs here, where a political football is being made of the fish business.

STRUCK WHILST PROCEEDING FROM SMOKEY.

A message was received in the city this morning stating that the *S. S. Kong Inge*, which went to Dominica to load fish for across has sprung a leak and will be obliged to come on to St. John's for repairs. The steamer is loading for Hiscok and was presumably proceeding from Dominica to Smoky to finish, when she struck a rock. According to the message the ship was nearly loaded, wanting 3,000 qts. to finish. The *Kong Inge* is owned in Norway, having been built in 1907. She is 1,218 tons gross.

Addresses Rotary.

REV. R. J. POWER ON BOY'S SURVEY WORK.

Rev. Dr. Power, pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, was the principal speaker at to-day's meeting of the Rotary Club. His subject was "Boy's Survey Work," and he dealt with it in a most interesting manner. Previous to Dr. Power's address, President G. E. Hunt paid a tribute to District Governor Walter Grant who left for home this afternoon on the *Sable*. Rotarian Grant, in recognition of his rep, referred feelingly to the reception which the St. John's Club had given him and hoped that it would not be long before he visited this country again. Three cheers were then given with a will for the District Governor. Mr. R. G. Rendell, who was present, then appealed to members of the Club on behalf of the poor among the fishermen of the country and told a touching story of the sad condition in which many families are placed to-day through no fault of their own. Chairman Horwood introduced Rev. R. J. Power who first referred to the value of work among the "rough diamonds" to be found among the boys of the city. The boy is the greatest asset that our country has to-day and in helping one, we help the other. He congratulated the Rotary Club on the business like manner in which the Boy Life Survey was being approached. The questionnaire which had been prepared fully covered the ground and could not be improved upon. A little care and expense would be considerably towards making many sickly boys physically fit. There seems to be a general discontent with our system of education to-day, said the speaker and he further referred to the carelessness and indifference of parents in this respect. Indifferent parents should not be allowed to deprive their boys of an education. The sport aspect should not be forgotten when the Survey is made, while he was very glad to see that the religious side had not been overlooked. If the clergy were given the information and the boys were left to them, they would do all in their power to help. Referring to the Survey, Dr. Power said that its success depended upon the thoroughness with which it was done. Perseverance and tact were very necessary qualities for those who took such a survey. In conclusion he told his hearers that the work they were engaged in was the great work of God. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded Dr. Power for his splendid address.
