THE RISING IN ITALY. Garibaldi's Escape Confirmed. BREAD RIOTS IN FRANCE. The Italian Ministry formed

London, Oct. 23.—Consols closed steady at 94 1/16; 5-20's, 89; Illinois Central 98; Erie 46 1/2. Liverpool, Oct. 23.—Cotton closed firm. Breadstuffs—corn is buoyant; new mixed Western 3d. higher; sales at 4 7/8 per quarter; wheat quiet; barley, oats and peas unchanged; beef 1 1/8; pork 7 1/2; bacon 4 5/8; cheese 5 1/2.

London, Oct. 23.—A delay in the trial of the Manchester rioters is asked by the counsel for the defence on the ground that the present excited state of public feeling which exists against the prisoners in Manchester, will interfere with the impartial administration of the law.

NEWARK, Oct. 23.—The third day of the Houghton meeting passed off with great spirit. The optional stakes were won by Calico. The sweepstakes of 30 sovereigns each was won by Rowster. The Glasgow stakes of 100 sovereigns each won by Michael DeBasco. The £30 stake was won by Pyshon.

Florence, Oct. 23.—A new ministry has been at last organized by Cialdini, as follows: President of the Council and Minister of foreign affairs, Gen. Enrico Cialdini; Minister of Interior, Gen. Giovanni; Minister of Justice, Senator Paoli Vignini; Minister of Finance, Chevalier Agostino de Pretis; Minister of public works, Signor Correnti.
