ELECTION NEWS.

The writ for North Grey election has been received by Mr. A. M. Stephens, returning officer, who has appointed August 8th for the nomination, and August 15th for polling day.

Mr. M. C. Cameron having retired from the Centre Division of Haron, a convention was held at Seaforth, on Wednesday, at which Mr. H. Horton, of Goderich, was nominated as the Reform candidate for Centre Haron. The nominations for the city of Ottawa took place on Wednesday. Mr. J. M. Currie, the former member, and Mr. J. B. Lewis, a leading barrister of the place, were returned by acclamation.

The canvass in Hamilton proceeds with unabated vigour. Committee and ward meetings are being held every night, where reports of the canvass are heard. Messrs. Irving and Magill are working with that energy which merits unbounded success. Report at present gives a large majority in their favour—and to all appearances there is not the slightest doubt of their being returned by a large majority. The so-called Tory, Coalition, No Party, Union, Progressive Reform, Secret Service money, and the People's Government candidates are working with desperation—they find that their cause grows weaker every day, and that, like the change of their own politics, for the worse.

Hon. Mr. Mackenzie had a splendid reception in St. Thomas on Wednesday. An immense crowd of people had assembled at the station who greeted the leader of the Liberal party with great cheering as he appeared. An address was presented to him, after which he made a splendid speech on the market square. The demonstration was a magnificent

success, and presages a great victory at the polls for the Reform party in the two Elgins. In the evening a public dinner was held in the Lisgar House, in honor of Mr. Mackenzie's visit, and as a continuation of the magnificent demonstration of the afternoon.

Mr. McGregor is at present suffering from a severe attack of illness, and is consequently unable to take the field in opposition to Mr. O'Connor in Essex. We are happy to learn that, under the circumstances, Mr. Arthur Rankin, formerly member for the county, has consented to take Mr. McGregor's place. We understand that he will be supported by all shades of the Opposition in the county.

The Reform canvass in Kingston is progressing most satisfactorily.

The Garibaldians.

PREPARATIONS FOR A NEW EXPEDITION. (From the London Crusader, June 22.) Authentic information received this week from Genoa, Venice and Rome, leave little room for doubting that the Garibaldians are preparing for some new expedition. Enrollments are being made openly at the old offices of the party, more especially at Venice, and a correspondent of the Bien Public, of Ghent, telegraphs that thirty Garibaldians left Rome on June 12 for Spain. We confess that we are at present unable to state whether their destination be Spain or Nice. There is great agitation at the latter town and a Radical newspaper there has just been suspended for declaring too boldly for "Union with Italy." The "Hero of Aspromonte and Mentana" has always openly declared that, after Rome, Nice was the place which he would attempt to revolutionize. It is quite possible the Italo-Prussian alliance may be openly proclaimed against France soon, and that a Garibaldian invasion of Nice may be the first step planned by Prince Bismarck toward the further dismemberment of France, by stripping her of Nice and Savoy.

The Piedmontese Government has been working hard at fortifying the Riviera between San Remo and Genoa, and several German military men have been lately inspecting the country. Should the Garibaldians land in France, we may expect to see the French Pontifical Zouaves reformed, and the two old enemies meet face to face. If they are left to fight it out, without the interference of Prussia, we have little fear as to the result. But the correspondent of the Bien Public and other well-informed persons in Italy believe that some point in the south of Spain is the rendezvous, and that on the abdication of Amadeus, which it is expected will shortly take place, an attempt will be made to proclaim a republic at Cadiz. Thus Spain will be menaced by a second Italian occupation, and this time an armed one.

If this be the case, we may expect to find the old enemies—Garibaldi and Zouaves—face to face; for, while it is understood at present that King Charles VII. is unwilling to accept the services of any foreigners in his attempt to drive out the usurper, yet it will be a different question when he has arrayed against him ten thousand, perhaps, of the scum of the Italian ports and of Alexandria, in addition to the numerous troops which the Spanish Republicans can now undoubtedly raise. However, "forewarned is forearmed," and whether the Garibaldians are destined for the Tyrol, for Spain, or for the Vatican, we trust the Catholic associations of Europe and America will be ready, and that when the inevitable hour of action comes the "red-shirts" will find the "Crusaders" prepared to meet them.
