The Council on its High

We think that the Council in pas sing a vote of censure on Mr. Crowe for certain expressions used by him in his letter which appeared in the MERCURY on the 13th inst., on the proposed new Town Hall, did a very foolish and ill-judged action. The language used by Mr. Crowe may not, in the strict sense of the word, be deemed parliamentary, but we feel satisfied that in using it he did not impute any corrupt motives to any member of the Council, but simply employed the expressions re-

ferred to as they are often used in conversation, and in a semi-slang Mr. Crowe is not accustomed to write for the press, or to trim his expressions and select his words like se who have spoken much, or written much for newspapers. The Council were well aware of this, yet in order to gratify their thirst for revenge, and vent their spite against a member who had handled them rather roughly, the majority passed a formal vote of censure. Nothing short of this, it seems, would soothe their wounded pride. Yet after taking this very extreme mode of assenting their dignity, they retuse to accept his resignation, or allow the ratepayers who placed him at the Council Board to give their opinion on his conduct, or pass judgment on his letters. There is a strange inconsistency ir, this which we cannot fathom. Were we in Mr. Crowe's place we would take good care that the ratepayers in the West Ward had an opportunity of recording their opinion on this contemptible action of the majority of the Council.

That majority, it seems to us, are strangely inconsistent in the course they have pursued in this matter. They Floor Oil Cloth, pretend to feel very indignant and very sore over the expression used by Mr. Crowe, yet at other times they will pass over unnoticed language which is not only unparliamentary but ungentlemanly. How often have we heard one Councillor use language towards another at the Council Board far worse than ever Mr. Crowe used, and yet no notice was taken of it. Why, on the very same night that all this hubbub took place, Mr. Heffernan characterized a Door Mats. statement made by Mr. Coffee as a wilful and malicious lie! Yet these purists who were so indignant at Mr. Crowe, never once thought of censuring Mr. Heffernan, but allowed it to pass without protest or condemnation. How consistent are these sticklers in upholding the honor and dignity of the Council!

Seeing the shape this matter has assumed, wethink it is now the duty of the ratepayers in the West Ward to take it up, and compel the Council either to accept Mr. Crowe's resignation, or rescind the motion of censure. If the majority of the Council don't know how to be consistent even in wrong-doing, the ratepayers will have to teach them.
