MAINLY ABOUT WOMEN

Well-Known Politician to Wed Popular Society Girl

An engagement of unusual interest to social circles in Calgary was that one announced this week by Mr. and Mrs. G. M. Lang, the daughter, Miss Kathleen, to Mr. John W. Mitchell, former mayor of this city, and very well known throughout the province. Felicitations and congratulations are being extended to the bride-elect and to ex-Mayor Mitchell by hosts of their friends in Calgary.

Miss Lang was one of the prettiest debutantes of 1911, making her bow to society at the Ross ball that season, and she enjoys unusual social popularity.

Mr. Mitchell, who has been a resident of Calgary for twenty-one years, coming here from Cambridge, Ont., has been prominent in public affairs of this city for the past ten years. He was one of the youngest aldermen of the city council when he was first elected in 1902, and served continuously on the council for seven years—five years as alderman and two years as mayor. He is a very prominent Odd-fellow, and a P. G. M. of the I. O. O. F. of Alberta.

His marriage has been arranged to take place in Calgary, June 11.

"THE NEED OF VOTES IN THE HOME," SUBJECT OF BRITISH NURSE BEFORE SUFFRAGE ASSOCIATION

HOBBING for her subject "The Need of the Vote in the Home," Miss Brayton, late of the Nurses' association in London, England, addressed the Calgary Suffrage society in the library yesterday afternoon.

"We so often hear that women's place is in the home," said Miss Brayton, "but this is mostly said by people opposed to women's suffrage, or by those who have never given the matter any serious thought, and consider this a good way of avoiding a more direct answer as to why women should not have the vote." Continuing, Miss Brayton said, "Some homes were not homes, that the women lived in terror of the men, were ill-treated, no redress, nor granted a separation unless the husband undertakes the case, and much cruelty left no mark on the face or body, and the women were not allowed to work, and were not allowed to read novels, or to go to the theatre, or to receive company, or to receive public appointments, and then only at reduced salaries. Through these women were intelligent and paid rent and taxes, they were not considered capable of making a vote. The same held good with women employing men servants. The men could vote but the

women who paid their wages were not 'intellectually capable' of doing so. A woman who took care of a sick husband, small children, and kept the home in order, and who was the hands, she could not have any say in the making of the laws, but the drunken wife-beater was recognized by the government as a 'person,' and voiced his opinion in the making of laws.

"Widely subjected is not so great in Canada as it is in Britain," said Miss Brayton, "but there are some Britishers here, too, who have brought their old-fashioned ideas and opinions with them." Continuing, Miss Brayton gave samples of some homes she had seen in the Old Country, where the women were in such total subjection that they could not dare demand food enough for themselves or their children, though their husbands brought the best of food, with which to feed their wives and children. "If all women stayed at home," continued Miss Brayton, "the world would know the awful conditions existing, and nothing could be done to set these things right, and surely no greater work can be done than the raising of public morals and manners, and who ever has many instances been reached only through legislation."

A vote of thanks was given to Miss Brayton for her interesting and instructive address.

After some discussion it was agreed that Mrs. Jameson, Mrs. J. A. Clark and Mrs. Labeau, act as convener of the election candidates for office, and find out their feeling with regard to the suffrage question.

NO GIRL OF 16 SHOULD BE ALLOWED TO READ NOVELS, IS KEYNOTE OF ADDRESS BEFORE LOCAL COUNCIL

"NO girl of 16 should be allowed to read novels," more than that, she should not be allowed to read our daily papers," was the statement made by Mrs. Cruickshank yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the Local Council of Women, held in connection with the discussion of the suppression of bad literature, and Mrs. Cruickshank said that the question raised had one thing in common, namely, that it was a matter of necessity, by many diverse opinions as to the good or bad qualities of books, but she has the opinion that if a book were well written it should be read, but cheaply written, it should be condemned; otherwise, a number of the classics would come under the heading of bad literature.

Mrs. Glass, acting in the absence of the secretary, read a report from the convention, held in Toronto, in which some books which should not be allowed. Mrs. Woodhall, with regard to this subject, also reported that she had not been able to point to a book as unfit to read, encouraged the sale of it.

Mrs. Cruickshank agreed with this, citing one case where a book was forbidden in Chicago, only to run the sale to thousands in New York.

In connection with forming a committee to look into this matter Mrs. Newhall said the work was not so great, as one could do nothing with anyone over 21, save ask the booksellers not to furnish their stock with books. In the case of boys' books they were obscene and could be handled by the police. It was agreed that Mrs. Kirk, as convener of the committee, with Mrs. Elliott, Mrs. Cruickshank, Mrs. Glass, Mrs. J. A. Clark and Mrs. Labeau, the entire executive to keep a watchful eye on all literature.

With regard to the Civic committee Mrs. Harold Riley stated that the men were doing good work in this and should not be interfered with. If they fell down the women would be ready to help. Mrs. Jameson, acting as convener with the executive to assist, and that they intend to take the matter to the council, and if necessary, to assist in any way the said council may see fit.

Mrs. Harold Riley asked if it would not be possible for the executive of the local council of women to arrange a definite date on which to hold their meetings, and moved that such meetings be held on the third Friday of each month at 3 p.m., the secretary to advise each member before each meeting. This was agreed.
