BANK NOT IN DANGER, WHITE

TORONTO, Jan. 6. - Sir Thomas White, former minister of finance in the Dominion government, declares in a statement given out here today, that no facts were at any time brought to his attention, while minister, justifying action on his part which would have brought about the suspension of the Home Bank, which eventually suspended payment on August 17 last, in liquidation.



SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed frown lands may be pre-empted by dritish subjects over 18 years of age, and by allens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural ourposes.

Full information concerning regu-ations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, flow to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov-enment Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timber-land, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; m nimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) and \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bufletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Lease of Crown Lands."
Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial pur-poses areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

GHAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province le divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, nambers and travellers, up to tea lead.
