### CURRENCY AND COMMENT

Daniel Kerswell, of Elgin Mills, has the distinction of being the first farmer to utilize the automobile for bringing produce to the Toronto market.

There is some prospect now that there will be a general election in the autumn. If so, it will probably take place about the end of November, after the redistribution bill has passed the House.

Rodney speaks well of local option, claiming business to be exceptionally good since its adoption on May 1st. Commercial travellers are said to be just as numerous as ever and hotel accommodation is good.

James Dickie, a farm employee in Southwold, has entered an action for \$2,500 against Westminster township for injuries received while driving to St. Thomas some weeks ago, when his horse fell into a defective culvert and threw him out of the buggy.

A large roll of bills was found hidden in the wall of a London house by some workmen who were making improvements to the building. The bills were in a good state of preservation, and had evidently been hidden there since the American civil war.

E. T. Hoskin, the veteran tinsmith of Strathroy, met with a serious accident last week. While making repairs to a house he fell off a ladder from a ladder he was ascending, sustaining a fracture of the collar bone and severe bruises about the head.

London real estate men report a tremendous demand for farms of from five to ten acres close to the city. Most of them sell at from \$200 to \$300 an acre and some fetch as high as \$500 an acre. People want orchards, and a farm with a good orchard and good buildings sells at a high figure.

All information required to be given during the taking of the census is collected under oath of secrecy, each enumerator being "sworn in" before he starts work. No one questioned need fear that answers will be given for taxation or any other purposes foreign to the census.

There is an almost alarming shortage of flax seed the world over, and the high prices of last year will probably be eclipsed by this year's crop. Most of the land and crop in the returns from a single planting of flax since the high prices went into effect.

A Paris preacher, who urged bearded relatives to spend their money on masses for the dead in place of flowers, is said to be responsible for a decline in the fashion of sending wreaths to funerals in that city, resulting in loss of employment to some 6,000 workmen, on whom 18,000 persons depend.

In spite of the rapid growth of the automobile industry and the many predictions that thereby have resulted the deathknell of the horse, old Dobbin and young Dobbin are steadily increasing in value. According to the report of the United States, the average value of horses there is \$11,077, which is nearly \$3 more than it was in 1910.

According to Mayor John J. Mitchell, of Bowmanville, Ont., who was interviewed recently, Bowmanville is experiencing a very lively industrial boom. The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company is tripling its facilities and is in need of 50 additional hands. The Dominion Piano & Organ Company, also other concerns, are in need of male and female help.

An Indiana firm recently closed a deal for the purchase of seventeen farms, situated in Raleigh, Romney and Tilbury East townships and amounting to 1,407 acres on which they had secured an option some time ago. Development work will be undertaken, after which the company purposes selling the properties to farmers from Indiana. Another company has also secured a large acreage.

The Petrolia Citizens' Band were badly "taken in" by a company who attempted to put on a performance there one night recently, the crowd becoming disgusted and making a stampede for the door when the program was about half over. The manager of the Wonderland theatre in the town, who had engaged the company for the two following evenings, paid them their contract price and let them go.

A trip to Scotland has been arranged by the Scottish people generally of the United States and Canada, the party to embark on the steamer "Grampian" on the evening of Friday, July 7, 1911. Tickets will be issued at a considerable reduction, good for 12 months. Excellent entertainers will accompany the excursionists on board ship and a reception committee will meet the party in Scotland. Any information relative to the trip may be had from the Allan Line, 77 Yonge St., Toronto.

J. Lockie Wilson, superintendent of agricultural societies, intends to stimulate the interest in fall fairs by having the farmers of the country enter their horses in jumping competitions, for which handsome prizes will be given. At present the only extra attraction at fall fairs is the trotting races, and Mr. Wilson thinks that if jumping competitions were held the farmers would enter their horses and some good sport would follow. It also would lead to more extensive breeding of high-class jumpers.

Dr. W. E. McKough, a prominent Chathamite, who has just returned from a trip to Europe and Palestine, says that everywhere people are talking of Canada. "Canada is the main topic of conversation in Old England just now," said the doctor. "Everybody is talking of Canada and her

great future, her trans-continental railways, and the immense strides she has made in the past quarter of a century. Even aboard ship the conversation seemed to always turn to talk of the Dominion.

The Dominion Railway Commission, in a letter recently sent out to the attorney-generals of all the Canadian provinces, claims that there is an unnecessary loss of life from trespassers on railway property, 293 persons being killed and injured during the year ending March 31, 1911. They are endeavoring to reduce this toll upon human life, but state that when they prosecute, many magistrates look upon the matter as so trivial that it is most difficult to obtain convictions. The commission urges a stricter enforcement of the law with regard to trespassers.

One of the most curious requests that a newspaper receives—and they are quite frequent—is the request for a free mention of some calendar, or colored poster gotten out as an advertisement. It means that the person making the request realizes that the people read what appears in newspapers, or they would not buy the paper, whereas they do not read free promiscuous dodgers, circulars, calendars and almanacs—consequently they want a line in the home paper to remedy the defect. It gets back to the motto of Marshall Field "One advertisement in the home is worth a hundred in the highway."

This is the season of the year when the parlor furniture does its semi-annual acrobatic stunt. The piano is moved from the north-east corner to the south-west bay window 10 feet 7 1/2 inches; the couch is hustled from angle B in alcove D, 6 links; easy chair No. 1 exchanges places with recliner No. 6; in the centre table is advanced three paces and the family bible is reversed. Grandma's picture is transferred to the dining room and Uncle John's to the woodshed. The wall motto, "No Place Like Home" is touched up with varnish, the furniture in general receives a few licks with the duster, father again is given his meals off the table instead of an upturned barrel on the back doorstep and housecleaning may be said to be over until the next time.
