CAREFULLY MANAGED.

Good Showing Made by the Merchant and the Montreal Banks.

Montreal, June 8.—The Merchants' Bank has issued a report of the year's business. The net profits of the year, after payment of interest and changes and deducting appropriations for bad and doubtful debts, have amounted to \$542,439 92. The balance from last year amounts to \$79,277 30, making a total of \$621,717 22. This has been disposed of as follows: Dividend No. 56, at the rate of 8 per cent per annum, \$240,000; dividend No. 57, at the rate of 8 per cent per annum, \$24,000; total, \$840,000. Amount carried forward to profit and loss account of next year, \$141,717 22. At the Bank of Montreal's annual meeting, which was held yesterday, satisfactory reports of the year's business was presented. General Manager Clouston, in addressing the shareholders, took a hopeful view of the situation, but urged extreme caution. 
