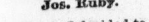

BYES AND WIDES.
An eleven of Bradford cricketers drove over to Paris on Monday and beat the Capital Club, of that town, by 112 runs to 87.

A remarkable record in cricket was recently made by Mr. W. W. Read, the famous Surrey batsman, who batted out 196 runs in a match with the Sussex eleven. In three successive matches he scored 415 runs in four innings.

The Welland Cricket Club visited Buffalo Tuesday and defeated what is supposed to be the crack eleven of that city by an innings and eleven runs. The Buffaloes failed to get an idea of the Welland bowling and the latter was short some of her crack bats.

The last mails from England give the result of the annual cricket match between Rugby and Marlborough, which resulted in an easy victory for the Marlboroughs by an innings and 78 runs. The Marlborough boys put together the magnificent score of 432, Messrs. Mortimer and Creed contributing 106 and 211 runs respectively. The Rugby boys made 221 in their first attempt, but being 211 behind in their second attempt. They made but 133 in their second attempt.

The D. A. C. team, of Detroit, went to Chatham yesterday to play one of the association schedule games.
