Romance of a Shopgirl.

Once Behind a Counter, Now Peeress of the Realm.

An Interesting Real-Life Chapter That Reads as Well as a Bit of Fiction—The "Humble" Dudleys.

London, Aug. 1.—Lady Dudley, whose husband has received one of the minor Parliamentary offices in connection with the new Salisbury Administration, is probably the only peeress of the realm who has risen from the ranks of a bona fide shopgirl to her present social eminence. True, she bore prior to her marriage the name of Gurney, one of her ancestors having been that Thomas de Gurney who murdered King Edward II. in such an appalling manner with hot iron bars. The young countess' father, however, met with business reverses and was compelled to resign his partnership in the Gurney Bank, as well as to surrender all his possessions for the benefit of his creditors. Mrs. Gurney thereupon opened a milliner shop in London, but met with scant success, her two daughters who had acted as assistants ultimately becoming saleswomen in the Regent street store of the modiste, Mme. Elise.

About a year previous to Lord Dudley's marriage the now widowed Duchess of Bedford and her sister, Lady Henry Somerset, interested themselves in behalf of the two young girls, and removed them to more congenial surroundings. Michael, the eldest, became a member of the household of the duchess, while the younger, now Lady Trowbridge, was adopted by Lady Henry Somerset. It was as the adopted daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Bedford that Michael Gurney married young Lord Dudley.

Lord Dudley bears the peculiar Christian name of Humble, which has been used by every male member of the family since the days of King Charles I., when the eighth Lord Dudley, ruined by profligacy and dissipation, redeemed the fortunes of his house by giving his granddaughter and sole heiress in marriage to Humble Ward, the court jeweler, who succeeded to the title as ninth Lord Dudley.

THE GOVERNMENT CENSURED.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 1.—The Grand Orange Lodge concluded its business at 2 o'clock this (Thursday) morning. Collingwood, Ont., was fixed upon as the next place of meeting.

There was a warm and protracted discussion in the Orange Grand Lodge tonight over a resolution censuring the Dominion Government for its stand on the Manitoba school question, and expressing sympathy with Manitoba. The resolution was supported by E. F. Clarke, Sam Hughes and Major Armstrong, and opposed by George Taylor, M.P., and Robert Birmingham. It was adopted after midnight, only ten voting against it.

FROST ON JULY 31

Killed the Potato Crop Near Lawton, Michigan.

Lawton, Mich., July 31.—Frost last night killed the entire potato crop on low lands. The loss is quite heavy. There is no damage to fruit.

DRENCHED THEM.

Salvation Army's Rough Treatment at Nebraska City.

Nebraska City, July 31.—The Salvation Army of this city were arrested on Saturday night and subsequently released because no charge could be brought against them. Being unable to suppress them by process of law, the city last night endeavored to drown them in the river. When the army appeared on the streets headed by "Joe," the chief, the fire department came out, and the fire hose to a hydrant and thoroughly drenched the Salvationists. All minded citizens denounce the performance.

THE MISSING YACHT.

Chicago, July 31.—Capt. R. N. Englis, who arrived here today, said he had reached the conclusion that there need be no uneasiness regarding his yacht, Sunbeam. The Sunbeam is expected in Chicago soon, but had not reached this afternoon.

FIRE ON LORD ABERDEEN'S RANCH.

London, B. C., July 31.—A large stable at the Coldstream Ranch, Lord Aberdeen's property, was destroyed by fire last night. Two horses perished in the flames. The loss is \$4,000, covered by insurance. The fire was caused by the explosion of a lamp.

Holmes-Mudgett.

Another Important Witness Against the Alleged Multi-Murderer.

Janitor Quinlan and His Wife Pass the Sweat-Box Ordeal.

How Holmes Accounts for the Disappearance of Miss Cigrand.

Chicago, July 31.—Detective Rea, of Fort Worth, last night telegraphed that Allen, now under arrest at Little Rock, Ark., is the much-wanted "Masco," and that he has given valuable information. By agreement between States Attorney Kern, Mayor Swift, Chief Badenoch and Attorney Capp, who represents the heirs of the missing Minnie Williams, the latter will leave for Little Rock tonight with credentials and authority for granting him the power to represent the State of Illinois in requesting the absolute and permanent release of Allen from the Arkansas penitentiary on condition that he fastens the crime of murder on Holmes by unmistakable and existing evidence in this city. Attorney Capp says: "We will prove absolutely that Holmes murdered the two Williams girls, Mrs. Connor and her daughter Pearl. We will bring Allen to Chicago, and he will tell the story of the murders as they were committed, and point to the place where the bodies were buried."

It is learned that arrangements were completed today for the taking of the testimony of John C. Allen, the Little Rock (Ark.) convict, whose testimony is expected by the police to convict Holmes of murder.

Chicago, July 31.—That Mrs. Quinlan, the wife of the janitor who is supposed to know so much about the misdeeds of H. H. Holmes, made a partial confession to the police this morning, is almost certain, although Chief Badenoch and Inspector Fitzpatrick refuse to say whether or not this was the case. Chief Badenoch declared that nothing had transpired which he could give to the press without injuring the police status of the case. He admitted, however, that Quinlan broke down completely under examination and wept like a child, but he denied that he had said anything which would implicate either his wife or himself in the various murders which have been laid at their doors.

The interview with Mrs. Quinlan which followed was sensational in the extreme. The statements of both Quinlan and his wife were taken by a stenographer. "Mrs. Quinlan was very much affected," said Chief Badenoch. "She not only wept throughout the whole interview, which I do not say was unusually severe, but she said: 'I call on God to witness that I know nothing more of the murder than I have already told. If Pat says I know anything more than I have told he simply lies, that's all.' This remark was called out by the deputy state's attorney, who said that her husband had confessed everything. At least, this is the story told, but it is believed from the whole circumstances of the interview, and from the way the police conducted themselves after coming out, that much more was said than the inquirers cared to give out."

Philadelphia, July 31.—The finding in the Little Rock (Ark.) penitentiary of the mysterious individual Hatch, who has figured so prominently in the celebrated Holmes case, has apparently upset the plans of the prosecutions of the self-confessed conspirator and multi-murderer, H. H. Holmes. If it can be proved that Hatch is the individual whom Holmes has dragged into the case as the custodian of the Piteel girls, whose bodies were found in Toronto, a new line of work will have to be started upon.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 31.—Holmes has an explanation for the disappearance of Miss Emeline Cigrand, one of his alleged victims. Holmes' explanation is clever, but lacking in essential particulars. Today Holmes said that he had led Miss Cigrand astray, confessed to her priest the told him of her downfall. The priest waited on Holmes and insisted upon him righting the wrong he had done by marrying the girl. He pretended to be willing to do so and so lulled the priest's suspicions. To satisfy the girl Holmes went through the ceremony of marriage with her, but unknown to the girl the man who officiated was not an ordained clergyman, but only a complaisant friend. Holmes and the girl lived together as man and wife for a short time, but when Miss Cigrand learned that she had been deceived and was not his legal wife she was overwhelmed with shame and remorse, left home and entered a convent. Where this convent is Holmes failed to state.

HOLMES' MILD MANNERS.

Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 1.—The prisoner Allen, known as the "Masco," said today: "Holmes had the most winning ways toward women of any man I ever saw, and never mixed up with any that were not good looking. He was also mild mannered, courteous and affable towards men."

There is perhaps no manner of swindling that Allen is not familiar with. Some people believe he is now engaged in a slick attempt to gain liberty by bartering his knowledge of Holmes' criminal career—knowledge that may have to be taken after all with a grain of salt.

CANNOT CONVICT HOLMES.

Chicago, Aug. 1.—The police acknowledge their complete defeat, so far, in their efforts to secure direct evidence of murder against H. H. Holmes. Dozens of promising clues have been carefully investigated; witness after witness, who was confidently expected to "tell all," has been examined without result, and at last the detectives have been unavailing, so far as real proof of guilt is concerned.

Inspector Fitzpatrick said today: "When we started on the case we knew it would be almost impossible to get anyone who could positively connect Holmes with any case of murder, yet we thought it our duty to investigate, and we have done the best we could. We believe several crimes have been committed, and believe that Holmes and his confederates are guilty of several murders. So far we are unable to prove our belief. We have no evidence that would cause even an indictment against any one under suspicion if it were presented to the grand jury."

THE SITUATION IN TORONTO.

Toronto, Aug. 1.—The police authorities in this city have not yet received any intimation with regard to the extradition of Holmes to stand his trial on a charge of murdering Alice and

Nellie P. Azel, and state that there is very little probability of their receiving any definite reply to their communication until the body of Howard Pietzel is discovered, or search for his remains abandoned. The analyst, into whose hands the viscera of the two girls murdered by Holmes in Toronto have been committed in order to determine, if possible, whether any traces of poison can be found, has decided to postpone further examination until a definite line of action has been determined upon by the authorities in Philadelphia.

Live News in a Line.

The Italian Chamber has voted confidence in the Cabinet almost unanimously.

The postoffice at Theresa, N. Y., was broken into on Tuesday night and robbed of about \$800.

Burglars broke into the Detroit postoffice on Tuesday night and about \$225 in money was taken, together with the contents of several registered letters.

The new Irish movement in New York, the object of which is to oppose all Parliamentary attempts to redress Ireland's grievances and advocate revolutionary measures, is about to take definite shape, and a convention to formulate a programme will shortly be held.

The Iron Age (New York) says: "Reports dealing with the conditions of the trade show some irregularity. On the whole, however, the industry is holding its own remarkably well, considering the heavy production of those mills which keep in the ranks in the worst of times and the accession of numerous plants long idle."

It is denied that Gov. William McKinley, of Ohio, is a member of the American Protective Association.

Colorado has been visited for two days with the most destructive rains and cloud bursts in the history of the State.

Burglars stole \$225 cash and some stamps from the Gravenhurst, Ont., postoffice on Tuesday night. They drilled a hole through the vault door and destroyed the lock.

The town of Socorro, New Mexico, was inundated by the overflowing of a mountain stream Tuesday, and hundreds of people were made homeless. Six members of the Durane family were drowned. The loss is \$1,000,000.

OTTAWA BREAKS.

Clarke Wallace at Loggerheads With the Government—A. W. Ross Resigns.

Ottawa, Aug. 1.—It is now believed that Comptroller Wallace must resign. He is in direct antagonism with the Government, of which he is a member. A. W. Ross, M.P. for L'Assomption, is said to have resigned because he was promised the Lieutenant-Governorship of Manitoba and has not got it.

A BRUTAL POLITICIAN.

Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 1.—Last night at Potts Camp, Miss., Joel Gattin, a politician, shot and killed Ed. West, a telegraph operator, for not trying satisfactorily in sending a message for election returns. No arrests have been made.

A POET'S WIFE DEAD.

Detroit, Aug. 1.—Mrs. Wanless, wife of Andrew Wanless, the well known Scotch poet and book dealer here, dropped dead in her husband's store yesterday. The cause of death was apoplexy. Mrs. Wanless was 50 years old and was born in Morpeth, near Ridge-town, Ont.

A PURSE FOR HAYHURST.

Ottawa, Aug. 1.—A circular letter is being sent out from the Department of Militia and Defense to the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the Canadian militia, suggesting that a purse or some sort of a testimonial should be presented to Private Hayhurst in recognition of his success in winning the Queen's prize. The circular is signed by Lieut.-Col. Prior, M.P., of Victoria, B. C. It is proposed to make the maximum subscription 25 cents, but anything less be acceptable, so that it may be a gift from all ranks.

THE STRIKE MAY SPREAD.

New York, Aug. 1.—Thus far 4,500 of the 16,000 tailors who struck last Sunday and Monday in the metropolitan district are again busy at work, the bosses having signed the union scale. It is said that the strike may become national. Philadelphia, Baltimore, Boston, Utica, Syracuse, Buffalo, Cincinnati and Chicago are all large clothing markets, where many thousands of workers are employed, and the large majority of them are organized.

Terre Haute, Ind., Aug. 1.—A strike of bituminous coal miners is expected by tonight everywhere in the State except in the Black coal fields.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 1.—Green glass manufacturers have declared a lock-out in all union factories, affecting 10,000 men.

COAL PRODUCTION OF THE WORLD.

According to the latest reports upon the coal industry, England is the largest producer in the world, her output during 1894 having been 188,277,525 tons. This was mined by 705,244 persons. The United States comes second in the list with 164,000,000 tons. Germany produced during the same year about 79,000,000 tons, exclusive of lignite. The other coal-producing countries mine practically the same amount from year to year, as follows: Austria-Hungary, 10,700,000 tons; France and Russia, 6,250,000 tons each; Australasia, 4,000,000; Japan, 3,250,000; Nova Scotia, 2,350,000; Spain, 1,300,000; British Columbia, 1,200,000; Italy, 300,000; Sweden, 200,000. The consumption of coal per head of population is lowest in Austria, where it is only one-sixth ton per annum, and highest in Great Britain, where each person averages three and three-tenths tons each year. In the United States the average is two and one-fourth tons a year.

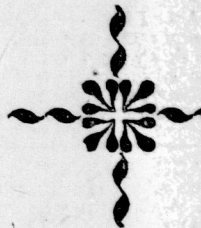
