FINE WEATHER.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—11 p.m.—An im-
portant high pressure area is tonight
central over the lower lakes, and
there are indications of the develop-
ment of a low pressure over the Gulf
of Mexico. The rapid development and
movement of a low area on Saturday
from the lower lakes to the Atlantic
brought moderate to fresh gales
throughout its course, attended by a
marked fall in temperature.

In the Dining-Room.

TUESDAY, OCT. 19.

● BREAKFAST—Grapes. Minced
meat on toast. Kentucky rolls.
● Eggs omelet. Coffee.
● LUNCHEON—Stuffed cold roast
with chili sauce. Boston bis-
cuit. Drop cakes. Chocolate.
● DINNER—Cream of celery soup.
● Chicken—Kentucky style. Baked
● apple pudding. Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them
in a scrap-book.
Kentucky Rolls—One pound of flour,
one pint of milk, one egg, one ounce
of butter, two tablespoons of yeast,
one saltspoonful of salt. Heat the
milk, add the butter and salt. When
lukewarm beat all together and set to
rise in a warm place not less than
three hours before wanted. When
done, knead the dough with a little
flour, last; cook in a little butter.

Egg Omelet (splendid)—Six eggs,
whites and yolks beaten separately,
half pint of milk, six teaspoon-
fuls of cornstarch, one teaspoonful
of baking powder and a teaspoonful
of sugar. Beat the whites stiff, add the
yolks, last; cook in a little butter.

Chili Sauce—Eight quarts of toma-
toes, three cups of peppers, two cups
of onions, all chopped very fine, three
cups of sugar, one cup salt, one cup
one-half cups of vinegar, three tea-
spoonfuls of cloves; some quantity of
cinnamon, two teaspoonfuls each of
ginger and nutmeg; boil three hours;
put tomatoes, peppers and onions
very fine; bottle up and seal.

Chicken—Kentucky Style—Kill the
chicken the day before it is cooked.
Split open on the back, as if to broil.
When all ready to cook, wipe dry, rub
with butter, pepper and salt. Put
in a pan with a slice of bacon or pork
in a pint of water. Simmer an hour,
basting frequently. When thoroughly
done, place on a hot dish.

Stir into the gravy remaining on the
fire a heaping cup of rice, mix it carefully.
Four this into the dish, but not on the
chicken. Sift over it cracker, first
with parsley and then pounded. Garnish
with parsley and serve.

Baked Apple Pudding—The yolks of
four eggs, six large peppers, grated,
three tablespoonfuls of butter, one
half cup of sugar, the juice and half
cup of one lemon. Beat sugar and
butter to cream, stir in yolks and
lemon with the grated apple. Pour in
lemon with the grated apple. Bake
nuttins on top. Eat cold with cream.

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KEEPING APPLIES.
Among the many methods of pre-
serving apples there are few which prove
more effective, more depending upon the
fruit itself than the care bestowed upon it.
Good sound keeping varieties will, how-
ever, go wrong if improperly stored or
neglected, and to persons who are care-
ful, it is as good as another. For the
careful, and those who want to be able
to have in winter the same good fruit
for private use, a new plan, said by a
French grower to be reliable, may be
mentioned. The fruit is gathered and
placed on wattled hurdles or wooden
trays in a room or outdoors which can
be tightly closed, the apples should
not be in contact with one another. A
fire made of twigs of green trees, cut-
tings of vines, or any shrubs, which
will burn for several days, should be
lighted and kept burning for four
or five days. At the end of this period
the apples should be packed in wheat-
straw in boxes, and the boxes should
be no apples touches another, and the box
closed. Treated in this way the apples
will, it is said, keep for a long time
soundness. It may be worth a trial
on a small scale.

Baptized at 91 Years.
Christian Workers' Ceremony at
the River Thames.

Four Candidates—One Woman and
Three Men Baptized in the Cold
Stream by Rev. H. McKenzie.

Yesterday was a fitting day as far
as sunshine was concerned for the
baptismal service of the Christian
Workers, held on the banks of the
Thames at the foot of Maitland street.
It was a bright day, but cold, and the
stream was several degrees lower in
temperature than the atmosphere,
which was sufficiently bracing to ren-
der an overcoat comfortable.

At 3:30, as the little band came forth
from the residence of Mr. Wray, on
Nelson street, with the four candi-
dates clothed in the flowing black
baptismal gowns, a multitude of people
lined the sides of the stream, the ma-
jority of whom were on the northern
bank. The discourse of people num-
bered about 1,000 when Rev. H. Mc-
Kenzie, the pastor of the flock, began
the services by a prayer. A hymn
was sung, after which Mr. McKenzie
read Acts 2, from verse 41 to the end,
and spoke on public professions by
baptism. This at an end, Mr. William
Stuart of London West was led into
the stream, while the congregation on
the bank sang "My Jesus, I Love
Thee." Mr. Wm. Stalter was the next,
and Mrs. Windersmer the third. The
latter seemed to stand the ordeal bet-
ter than the others.

The fourth candidate was one who
excited no small degree of interest. He
was Mr. D. McLaughlin, who was led
into the stream, aged 91 years. His form
was bent and his steps feeble. The cold
water did not seem to affect him, and
he shook violently as he came
from the water to shore, where wraps
and a hot drink were at hand. The
other candidates had gone on foot,
and made comfortably by dry clothes.
His example expressed the curious
sight-seers with the solemnity of the
services were held at which the candi-
dates received the hand of fellowship
and were received into the fold.

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
