War Against The World

Declared by China When She Fired on the International Fleet.

Two Forts Blown Up After a Bombardment of Seven Hours and 400 Chinese Killed-Internationals Lose 21 Killed and 57 Wounded-Allied Forces Land and Seize the Taku Fortifications-Official Statement Made

in the House of Commons.

China declared war against the world when the Taku forts opened fire upon the international fleet. The best semiofficial account is the dispatch received

from Chefoo, via Berlin, as follows: Later a semi-official dispatch from Chefoo announced that the Taku forts had been captured after a combined attack by the foreign warships. Three men on the German warship Iltis were

killed and seven were wounded.

The dispatch added that the foreign settlements at Tien Tsin were being fired into by the Chinese. When the dispatch left nothing had been heard from the German detachment sent to Pekin, or from the German legation

The unofficial narratives, coming by way of Shanghai vary widely, and bear internal evidence of supplementing the main facts with guesswork. One dispatch says that the Yorktown participated in the bombardment. Another asserts that American marines formed part of the storming force of 2,000.

THE CASUALTIES. A press dispatch from Chefoo, dated esterday afternoon, says the forts on both sides of the Taku are now occu-The Chinese opened fire unexpectedly. The casualties to the mixed forces were as follows: Killed-British 1, German 3, Russian 16, and French 1. Wounded—British 4, German 7, Russian 45, and French 1. The Chinese

Mr. Brodrick added that British, Russian, Japanese, and French reinforcements were due to arrive about Thursday. Within the last hour, Mr. Brodrick said he had heard that the telegraph line from Taku to Tien Tsin had been restored. The fitting out of the Japanese battleship Asahi, of 15,200 tons, being finished at Clyde bank, is being expedited, and she is under orders to sail within a week.

THE PREMIER'S STATEMENT Lord Salisbury was questioned in the House of Lords today on the Chinese situation, and said he regretted he was unable to enlighten the house on the state of affairs in China. Admiral Seymour had returned to Tien Tsin, but the government did not know exactly why, or what Admiral Seymour's intentions were. The failure of the in-ternational forces to reach Pekin has greatly intensified the anxiety here, as to the fate of the Europeans huddled together in the legations at the Chinese capital, and it is feared also that the check to Admiral Seymour's forces, necessitating their return to Tien Tsin, will make large accessions to the make

FRANCE IN A FEVER. Paris, June 19.-The French consulgeneral in South China, who was instructed to send into Tonquin all the French citizens at Yunnan-Shen, cables from the latter place, under date of Thursday, June 14, that he has been prevented from leaving with his companions by the viceroy, and that his home and all the missions have been burned. He adds that everything, including their clothes, have been stolen, and that they are practically prisoners. French troops are massed on the Tonquin frontier of China, but their march has been delayed, as the French authorities fear to provoke an uprising of the population and a massacre of the Europeans before the troops could reach them. M. Delcasse has summoned the Chinese minister to Paris, and has requested him to immediately telegraph to the viceroy of Yunnen-Sen, informing the latter that France will hold him per-

sonally responsible for the fives of French citizens. TORPEDOS IN THE RIVER. Berlin, June 18.-The German consul at Che-Fu telegraphs that a Japanese torpedo boat from Taku has brought

the following: "The Chinese laid torpedoes in the Taku River and collected troops from Shan-Hei-Kwan. The foreign commanders assembled on the Russian flagship and addressed an ultimatum to the commanders of the Taku forts, which the Russian, British, French and

were destroyed. Communication by water is also threatened." Later a semi-official dispatch from Che-Fu announced that the Taku forts had been captured after a combined attack by the foreign warships. Three men on the German warship Iltis were killed, and seven were wounded. The dispatch added that the foreign settlements of Tien-Tsin were being fired into by the Chinese. CHINA. Chicago, June 18 .- A special to the Tribune from Denver says: Bishop Earl Cranston, who recently returned from China, declared from the pulpit today that civilized nations must rule China. "It is worth any cost in money," he said, "It is worth any cost in bloodshed, if we can make the millions of Chinese true and intelligent Christians. I would cut all the red tape in the world, and break all the treaties ever made, to place the armies of the United States in the fore next to Great Britain. The open door must be maintained for Christianity as well
