"Secondly, this country has been asleep for 20 years—or during the whole period of the Salisbury administration. England has seemed content to rest on its laurels. We imagined ourselves so far ahead of every other country in the world that we saw no necessity for exertion. We are just waking up to a realization of the fact that we are getting left. America has set the pace, and we shall have to follow her example, both as to government methods and commercial system if we wish to retain any position in the world's affairs, or, indeed, regain

what we have lost. "Thirdly, Americans are coming over to this country and are beginning literally to run it. Every year sees more and more American enterprise here. As England sends her white men to Africa to exploit the country and make the negroes work for them, America is sending her Morgans and Yerkeses over here and exploiting our

"We are the negroes in the case, the Americans are the white men. American ways and methods will be me naturalized here, and then we shall wake up and find ourselves Americanized, with the American form of government and all the rest."

Wayne, W. Va., Sept. 9.-At Genoa, a small town ten miles south of this place, occurred on Saturday morning a tragedy that has startled the entire southern section of this State. In a frenzy of religious excitement Maurice Wilson, a minister, who for more than 50 years has been prominent in the councils of Baptist churches in this section, drew his razor across the throat of his aged wife, causing instant death.

As she sank lifeless to the floor the gray-haired parson repeated the scriptural passage: "Without the shedding of blood there can be no remission of


A neighbor, who was attracted to the parson's home, broke down the door. The minister waved aloft the bloody razor, and, with his eyes turned upward as to his God, proclaimed in a tone of ecstatic fervor: "The Lord's will be done. Blessed be the name of

Before the neighbor had recovered from his astonishment sufficiently to stop the murderer, he had taken up Bible, and, still waving in the air the bloody weapon of death, escaped from the house by a back door. He has not since been seen, but it is thought he is hiding in the dense woods near his home. He is more than 80 years old, and it is not thought that can remain long in the forest. The evening before the murder Wil-

son had preached at Genoa from the text, "Without the shedding of blood there cannot be any remission of sin," and the fervor of his utterances at that time was remarked by many of his hearers. Rev. Mr. Wilson was one of the oldest divines of his church, of the oldest divines of his church, and although he has not been in active work for some time, he has filled the pulpits in some of the most important churches of the State. For three weeks religious meetings have been in progress at Genoa, and the aged minister had always taken an active part.
